

RECEIVING THE SACRAMENTS

The seven Sacraments of the Church were instituted by Christ to confer grace.

Sacrament of Baptism. Call the office to register for Parent Pre-Baptismal Instruction. For adults seeking to enter the Church and be Baptized, contact our Religious Education Office.

Sacrament of Reconciliation (Confession). Children in our religious education program and school are prepared for Confession at age seven as part of First Communion preparation.

Sacrament of the Holy Eucharist. Children in our religious education program and school are prepared for First Communion at age seven. Adults seeking First Communion should contact our Religious Education Office. To request a visitation for Holy Communion to the Sick, contact our parish office.

Sacrament of Confirmation. Young people in our

parish are prepared for reception of Confirmation in the ninth grade (age 14). Adults seeking Confirmation should contact our Religious Education Office.

Sacrament of Marriage. Couples planning for Marriage are to contact a parish priest or deacon one year in advance to set the wedding date and plan for pre-Cana instruction.

Sacrament of Holy Orders. If you believe you have, or someone you know has, a vocation to the Priesthood or Diaconate, please contact one of our parish priests.

Anointing of the Sick. For the Sacrament of Anointing of the Sick, which is administered by a Priest, a person or an immediate family member must make the request. Late night requests may not be able to be answered until the next day.

Dear Parishioners,

On January 1, we celebrate the solemnity of the great Mother of God, Mary, most holy. The feast that was previously celebrated on this day, prior to 1970, was the Feast of the Circumcision of the Lord. The readings at Mass for this day currently are actually the same readings that used on this day when it was the Feast of the Circumcision of the Lord. The Gospel reading, then and now, relates to us about Mary and Joseph taking Jesus to be circumcised:

When eight days were completed for his circumcision, He was named Jesus, the name given him by the angel before he was conceived in the womb.

Law and Order – and More. Though the readings have not changed, the focus of those readings has. With the Feast of the Circumcision, these readings were seen to make note of Mary and Joseph meeting the obligation of Jewish law, following the established order. Today, those self-same readings, due to the focus on Mary's motherhood, emphasize her faithfulness in living out her faith and meeting her obligations of faith because of her love of God, and her fealty to Him (that is, being the handmaid of the Lord, and serving the call of God). This great holy day honors Mary, the Mother of God in that glorious and unique place of service in salvation history.

More than Maids-a-Milking. Today, also marks the Octave Day of Christmas (the eighth day of Christmas); but don't think of "Maids-a-Milking," as the famous Christmas song commends, think of it as the final day of most exultant portion of our Christmas season: the last of eight days of celebrating the very day of Christmas. But, the season is not over, as we await, during the succeeding days of Christmas season, both the Epiphany of the Lord and the Baptism of the Lord (which ends the season).

First Things First. The Octave Day of Christmas, the Solemnity of Mary, Mother of God, and the Circumcision of the Lord all coalesce on the liturgical calendar on the first day of January. But, outside the ecclesiastical realm, January 1 also has a special place in the world in general: The first day of the first week of the first month of the New Year, marks the beginning of the civil New Year of 2024 (FYI, a year whose numbering is normed by the Birth of

Christ). So, let's talk about January and the New Year.

A Two-Faced Month. The name of the month "January" comes from the name of the Roman god Janus. Janus had two faces: one face looking to the past and the other looking to the future. As we enter the new year of 2024, it is indeed a good time to prayerfully look back at the year that has just ended and to look with hope to the new year ahead of us. John Lennon in his 1971 hit, "Happy Christmas," said it well: "And so this is Christmas, and what have we done, another year over, and a new one just begun."

What Have We Done? And so, at this time of year, we ask ourselves "and what have we done?" We ask ourselves a battery of questions about the year that just passed. We look back, hopefully not just to lament or just to celebrate, but rather to use that time of retrospection to determine how we can do better, what we need to change and how to move forward in the coming year.

To Thine Own Self. A review of the past year helps us to set goals and resolutions for the new year. But for us we perhaps often fall into the way of our culture by making mere wishes rather than making real and honest resolutions. The culture tells us that you can do and be anything you want; that sounds nice and uplifting, but it is not true. We have to be honest with ourselves, and know our own limitations. One can wish and wish, but a blind man will not become a baseball umpire; a paraplegic will not become a tap dancer; Lucy may wish to get into Ricky's show on every episode of "I Love Lucy," but it is not in the cards; and I may want to be the center on the Philadelphia 76ers, but that is not going to happen. As the old saying goes, "If wishes were horses, beggars would ride!"

Of "Wishcraft" and Genies. So, for us, resolutions cannot be fantastical wishes that some genie will magically grant. No, for us resolutions must be real improvements: they identify things we should be doing, but are not doing. They are changes we need to make and can make in our own life, by examining ways to overcome obstacles in our

I have to tell you how charmed we were all weekend listening to Sam as we decorated for Christmas. This year, we purchased one of those white cut out figure nativity sets for the front yard. As we set it up, Sam looked specifically for the "Mother Mary" and the "baby" and said they were his best friends. He carried them around much of the day. He insisted on putting the baby up in his room until Christmas when we could put him outside. When he saw the table I set up my nativity on, he called it a "prayer table" and said "Ms. Traynor has one." He is getting very good at saying his prayers and often insists on saying them "by himself" for the family before dinner and at night. We couldn't be happier with his religious education, especially my husband John. I think I told you about his discussion that "public school was just fine" for him when I told him I planned to send Sam to Holy Cross. Now, John beams when Sam comes home with a new song or prayer that he has learned at school. Thank you so much for being such a crucial part of his learning. We couldn't do this without you!

Rest assured that the best gift you could have given your children this Christmas season is the gift of a Catholic education. The value of this gift is immeasurable and lifelong. It may not be in a lovely box underneath the Christmas tree, but it is all wrapped up in a beautiful package. Their best gift this season and for all seasons is Holy Cross School and all that rests inside.

It is on behalf of those who enrich your children's lives every day; the faculty and staff of HCS that I extend warm and heartfelt wishes for a blessed New Year filled with bounteous blessings and lifelong memories all through 2024.

path that may keep us from the right path; the path to which Christ beckons us.

Climb Every Mountain. I am reminded of the song "Up Where We Belong" from the movie "An Officer and a Gentlemen" – one of the lines in that songs noted, "There are mountains in our way, but we climb a step every day." Resolutions are ways to make those steps and to climb those mountains in our life. In making those steps, Jesus Christ, our Lord and our God, is both our guide and our companion, and the one who can make our climb successful. Our faith in Christ and his Church is what allows us to move forward and move mountains! Same Old, same old? I am reminded of a song played on the radio during this time of year, by singer Dan Fogelberg, called "The Same Old Lang Syne." In that song, the singer spends his time looking back on an old relationship, rather than looking forward. One Christmas Eve, the snow was falling beautifully, and he meets his old girlfriend. Amidst the beauty of the snow, the two people talk about old times, they reminisce, and they do all of those things we do when catching up with old friends. And as the snow continues to fall, the two of them share a beer in her car, and they talk and talk. The singer then wishes, wishes, wishes that perhaps they could get back together and relive their former ways of life —their glory days— even though she is now married. But then, reality sets in, and the real world comes down on him like an anvil. And as the two of them part ways, he watches her drive away. The singer then laments, "And as I turned to make my way back home, the snow turned into rain."

A Lot of Salt. This is what can happen to us when we bind ourselves to this world and are always looking backwards and not ahead. For instance,

- When we lament what others have that we don't.
- When we lament what was left behind.
- When we lament what could have been.

Now, there is nothing intrinsically wrong with remembering or reminiscing, because it is, in fact, what we learn from the past that can help us with the present and the future. However, while it is good and fine to remember the past, we cannot languish there. That's what happened to Lot's wife. In the Book of Genesis, as Abraham and others looked ahead to the promised land, she looked back, and wound up frozen as a pillar of salt, unable to ever look forward. I would commend any of you who are of this mindset, lament all you want, but life doesn't have an undo button – thus, we must look forward. We can remember yesterday, but our eyes must be on tomorrow.

Cooperating with God. It is only when we look ahead to the promises of our Lord, to the hope of Heaven, to the joys of faith, that we shall we be able to realize our New Year's resolution of a new and strengthened life in union with God and his Holy Church... a Church that was born of his Son, who was born of his mother Mary, who pondered all of these things in her heart, and cooperated with God's grace to the fullest.

The Example of Mary. And so, let our resolution for this new year — and for every year to come — be this: To follow the example of Mary, the Mother of God, who trusted in the Lord, and who didn't fear the future, as she declared, "Let it be unto me according to the thy word." Those ten little words are the ingredients of one big happy year ahead for us all in 2024. Mary, Mother of God, pray for us!
