

RECEIVING THE SACRAMENTS

The seven Sacraments of the Church were instituted by Christ to confer grace.

Sacrament of Baptism. Call the office to register for Parent Pre-Baptismal Instruction. For adults seeking to enter the Church and be Baptized, contact our Religious Education Office.

Sacrament of Reconciliation (Confession). Children in our religious education program and school are prepared for Confession at age seven as part of First Communion preparation.

Sacrament of the Holy Eucharist. Children in our religious education program and school are prepared for First Communion at age seven. Adults seeking First Communion should contact our Religious Education Office. To request a visitation for Holy Communion to the Sick, contact our parish office.

Sacrament of Confirmation. Young people in our

parish are prepared for reception of Confirmation in the ninth grade (age 14). Adults seeking Confirmation should contact our Religious Education Office.

Sacrament of Marriage. Couples planning for Marriage are to contact a parish priest or deacon one year in advance to set the wedding date and plan for pre-Cana instruction.

Sacrament of Holy Orders. If you believe you have, or someone you know has, a vocation to the Priesthood or Diaconate, please contact one of our parish priests.

Anointing of the Sick. For the Sacrament of Anointing of the Sick, which is administered by a Priest, a person or an immediate family member must make the request. Late night requests may not be able to be answered until the next day.

Dear Parishioners,

Trivial Matters. I like trivia... odd facts... bizarre questions. For example: (1) If you are a swashbuckler do you swash your buckle or buckle your swash? (2) If you are engaging in tintinnabulation, what are you doing? (3) If you take a kakapo, a toucan, a seagull, and a canary, and you release each one from the top of the Empire State building. Which one will stay in the air for the shortest amount of time after you release it? (4) If you have an inch-worm, does that inch-worm live-and-die as an inch-worm or does it become something else? For me, these are the silly, but trivially invigorating questions that titilate the mind. For the record, the answers are: (1) You swash your buckle. (that is to say, you raise and move your shield to protect yourself); (2) "Tintinnabulation" is the act of ringing a bell; (3) The kakapo, because it can't fly and will plummet to the ground in a matter of moments; and (4) An inchworm is not a worm at all; it is a form of a caterpillar, and it undergoes a metamorphosis and becomes a moth.

Beginnings. Ah, that little inch-worm moving upon the ground, marks the beginning of the fluttering life of the moth that takes to the air. That inchworm, to quote once of my favorite songs by the group Chicago from their 1970 hit "Beginnings" is "only the beginning, only just the start." Just as the caterpillar is the start of the beautiful butterfly, the kernel is the start of popcorn, and the acorn is the start of the great oak tree, the inch-worm is the beginning something good.

Happy New Year. And on the matter of beginnings, this Sunday is the start of the new Church year; it is the beginning of the Season of Advent. The Season of Advent starts on the first Sunday of Advent, and with it an entire new Church year lies ahead. While the civil new year begins on January 1, for the Catholic Church the new year arrives today, this Sunday, with the start of Advent. And unlike the January 1 "New Year" the new Church year doesn't begin with celebration and festivity — it begins with a four week period of preparation for the coming Christ, and takes on a penitential tone as we prepare for the big event. And for us the big event is not the start of the new Church year, but rather what lies ahead: the celebration (on December 25) of the first born of the new creation, Jesus Christ: mankind's new beginning, and salvation.

Be Prepared. Advent, the beginning of the Church year, is connected to a few important "beginnings" in our Catholic faith. The most obvious of those was noted above: Jesus Christ who is the beginning and the end, the Alpha and the Omega. His coming into this world, for which Advent prepares us, marks a

new beginning for mankind — his birth is the beginning and the fulfillment of the long awaited hope for a Messiah. To quote from "O Holy Night," he is "the thrill of hope" for which a "weary world rejoices." And Advent marks the beginning of that period of preparation for his coming.

Good Things Come in Threes. In addition to coming of Christ into the world, there are two other beginnings that dance around the Season of Advent that are worth noting. And they have to do with "Apostolic succession" and the salvation history.

St. Andrew and November 30. The Season of Advent begins on the Sunday closest to feast of St. Andrew (November 30). The question is this: Is that a coincidence? Or is St. Andrew's feast being in that position intentional? That is to say, could November 30 have been the Feast of St. Cunegunda, the Feast of St. Vincent de Paul or the Feast of St. Demetrius the Myrrh Streamer (that's a real thing, look it up), or is St. Andrew's placement at the doorstep of Advent to be considered meaningful? While the answer to that question could be argued both ways, I like to think that it is intentional, and, in fact, quite meaningful.

Call Awaiting. So, what is the meaning of St. Andrew's feast day signaling the beginning of the Church year? Or better put why is his feast day, November 30, meaningful to the beginning of the Church year. Well, St. Andrew was the first Apostle called by Christ; the first of the Twelve. Thus, just as Advent marks the beginning of the Church year, St. Andrew marks the beginning of the Apostles, and the beginning of what we call "Apostolic Succession." That is, it marks the beginning of the idea that Christ came into this world as a new born king, and after he would ascend back to the heaven, he would leave a line of successors, shepherds (a.k.a., Bishops) — that can forever be traced back to Him to continue to lead that Church that he would create. And that line of succession began with St.

Norm! When we pray in the Nicene Creed, "I believe in one, holy, catholic and apostolic Church," that term apostolic speaks about the lineage of Apostles chosen by Christ and their successors (most especially in the person of the Pope). And thus, the beginning of the Church year (the Sunday closest to feast of St. Andrew) is normed by celebration of Jesus' calling of the first Apostle (Andrew), and the beginning of Apostolic succession — the beginning, in kernel

Today is the first Sunday in Advent. It's time to break out the purple and green. It's time to focus on so many aspects of the season that is not Christmas. I have wondered so many times as to why the season of Advent doesn't seem to get the same amount of attention paid as does the season of Lent. Maybe it's only me, but it does appear that because the red, green and sparkly season of Christmas seems to begin on the evening of Thanksgiving Day (or earlier?) that the meaningful season of Advent seems to be overlooked. I realize that in the commercial world of retail, Christmas is a retail boon, but do we all have to fall victim to their snare?

The season of Advent is a time for preparation. A preparation of the heart. To make a welcoming place for the newborn savior in our heart in a way that the innkeeper was unable.

At Holy Cross we avoid the snare. Symbols of the season abound inside and out. There is an Advent wreath, or a Nativity scene (minus the baby Jesus) in every classroom and hallway. Our annual Jesse Tree sits beautifully beside the ramp in what has become known as the HSA corner. Mrs. Klaus has overseen the distribution of the blank balsa wood ornaments. Each ornament that goes on the Jesse tree bears a symbol that represents an event or a person leading up to the foretold coming of the Messiah. The students put a great deal of effort into their designs resulting in a beautiful symbol of the season admired by all.

Our eighth graders always look forward to pairing up with their prayer partners for fellowship and Advent wreath making. Advent wreaths are not difficult to make. You can make one with just a few supplies, some can be found around your own house. An Advent wreath is a beautiful way to talk about the idea of religious symbolism with children. The circle of the wreath, with no beginning and no end, symbolizes God's eternal nature. The evergreen branches symbolize the immortality of the soul. Decorative pine cones or seed pods symbolize new life and resurrection. The four candles symbolize the four weeks of the Advent season, but also the four thousand years from the creation of Adam and Eve to the birth of Jesus Christ. Traditional Advent prayers can be found online. There is a fabulous website for great ideas for any season incorporating a Catholic influence. https://www.catholicicing.com/advent-ideas/ Will you light the first candle on the family Advent wreath this evening? Symbolism is important because it provides a visual of some sort that children can associate with a season such as Advent.

Children of all ages enjoy listening to the words of the stories of the coming of Jesus. The trek to Bethlehem, the stable story, the lovely pictures that children associate with the days leading to the birth of our Savior all help to create the sense of anticipation and making a pathway for Jesus as we make a gradual approach to the season of Christmas.

Speaking of stories, the story of St. Nicholas is enjoyed by all following the discovery of the goodies left behind in the shoes outside the classroom doors! And, the story of St. Lucy told on her Feast Day, December 13th, is made all the more memorable when children in Kindergarten enjoy cinnamon rolls for snack that day! The story of St. Lucia (Lucy) is an interesting one to tell to the children. I would encourage you to share it with your children, even if you don't go all out and make the crown. A great family tradition to start---baking cinnamon buns as a family gathered in the kitchen.

There are literally hundreds of ways to observe and enjoy the season of Advent as a family who makes a slow, and gradual approach to the Christmas holidays. The season becomes so much more meaningful when the true meaning of the season is left intact. Family traditions are formed that can be shared with others from generation to generation.

It is what we encourage. We know it's difficult. But, not impossible. As a family we challenge you to embrace the season of Advent. Find ways to adorn your home in the rich and regal purple signifying the coming of the King. And....enjoy it.

Hail and blessed be the hour and the moment In which the Son of God was born.... form, of our Church becoming "apostolic."

An Immaculate Beginning. The Season of Advent also is home to another beginning: The Immaculate Conception of the Blessed Virgin Mary (December 8) in the womb of St. Ann. The Solemnity of the Immaculate Conception is the only universal solemnity that lands fully within the Season of Advent. Is that significant? Yes, it is, and here's why: The Birth of Jesus Christ (God-in-the-flesh) identifies Christ as the first born of the new creation. The new creation is the time of man's redemption by way of the coming of the Messiah —the Word-made-flesh—into our world for "us men and for our salvation" (as per the Nicene Creed).

What's Up Doctrine. The coming of Christ and His being born into the world, in a grand sense, didn't just begin with Mary saying "yes" to God at the Annunciation (celebrated on March 25), but rather traces back to the Immaculate Conception (December 8), with Mary's being conceived in the womb of St. Ann. The Immaculate Conception is the doctrine that God preserved the Virgin Mary from the taint of original sin from the moment she was conceived, making her the "Singular Vessel of Devotion" and "New Eve" from whom salvation would be born into this world. Thus Advent, the beginning of the new Church year, normed by the beginning of the call of the first Apostle, also gives home to beginnings of the new creation and the beginning of our salvation bound up in the doctrine of the Immaculate Conception.

The Most Important Beginning. All good things come to an end, so the saying goes. But the corollary to that statement is that all good things also come from a beginning. And this Season of Advent is all about beginnings: beginnings, whether related to Mary or St. Andrew or salvation history, that see their fulfillment in the birth of Christ on December 25, when Christ comes into the world. Our faith is built on the person of Jesus Christ, our salvation is built on his love for us and his salvific actions, and our redemption began when God-became-man on that first Christmas all those years, when on that "night Divine" God touched mankind in the most profound manner. Advent is the Season that allows us time to prepare, ponder, and express penitence, as we stay watchful awaiting that moment, that new beginning — that coming of Christ.

Living on a Prayer. Or perhaps this idea more simply expressed to us in the opening prayer (the collect) for the first Monday of Advent. That pray says:

Keep us alert, we pray, O Lord our God, as we await the advent of Christ your Son, so that, when he comes and knocks, he may find us watchful in prayer and exultant in his praise. Who lives and reigns with you in the unity of the Holy Spirit, God, forever and ever. Amen.

The Waiting. With the Season of Advent, Church in her wisdom commends us not to celebrate Christmas before Christmas but rather take some time, some beautiful time, reflecting on the coming of Christ, contemplating his second coming at the end of time, and considering all the facets of key moments in salvation history. Advent is the start of the new Church year... and the Good News is that this is only the beginning. And this beginning is related to two other beginning that are worthy of our contemplation: the beginning of the new creation in the Immaculate Conception, and beginning of the Apostolic succession (and our Apostolic Church) in kernel form, with the calling of St. Andrew, whose feast day reckons the start of Advent.

Christ is Coming. So, take time this Advent, to prepare your heart for the coming of Christ. If your faith is strong make this Advent a beginning-time to build-up your faith even more. If your faith has waned, make this Advent a beginning-time to renew your faith. The first words of the first reading from the first Sunday of Advent: "The days are coming, says the Lord, when I will fulfill the promise I made to the house of Israel and Judah." Translation: Christ is coming! Be prepared.

Get Ready! The Church is telling us what a hit song by The Impressions from 1965 once told us, "People get ready!" And thus, the Church blesses us with a season of waiting, of preparation — of Advent! A time to get ready, a time for waiting. But remember always that in Advent we are not waiting for the sake of waiting – rather we are waiting for something wonderful, something amazing, something salvific. It is now the start of that waiting period. And it is only the beginning!
