LENT

The rules for fasting an abstinence for Lent are as follows:

• Every person 14 years of age or older must abstain from meat (and items made with meat) on Ash Wednesday, Good Friday, and all the Fridays of Lent.

• Every person between the age of 18 and 60 must fast on Ash Wednesday and Good Friday.

• Every person 14 years of age or older must abstain from meat (and items made with meat) on all other Fridays of the year, unless he or she substitutes some other form of penance for abstinence.



Sacrament of Confirmation. Young people in our parish are prepared for reception of Confirmation in the ninth grade (age 14). Adults seeking Confirmation should contact our Religious Education Office.

Sacrament of Marriage. Couples planning for Marriage are to contact a parish priest or deacon one year in advance to set the wedding date and plan for pre-Cana instruction.

Sacrament of Holy Orders. If you believe you have, or someone you know has, a vocation to the Priesthood or Diaconate, please contact one of our parish priests.

Anointing of the Sick. For the Sacrament of Anointing of the Sick, which is administered by a Priest, a person or an immediate family member must make the request. Late night requests may not be able to be answered until the next day.

pastor's column

Dear Parishioners,

This is a continuation from last week's column. Blessed Holy Week to you all.

HOLY THURSDAY. On Holy Thursday, Jesus gathered with his Apostles for a Passover meal (the Last Supper). There, Jesus makes alludes to the idea that Judas would betray him: "Amen, I say to you, one of you will betray me." (Matthew 26:21). No one says a word, except the guilty party, Judas: "Surely it is not I, Rabbi?" Jesus responds, "You have said so." Then, Judas, realizing that folks are on to him, slips away.

Institution of the Eucharist and Holy Orders. As that gathering continues, Jesus Christ institutes the Sacrament of the Eucharist. As we recount at Mass, Christ said, "Take this all of you, and eat of it, for this is my body which will be given up for you... Take this all of you and drink from it, for this is the Chalice of my blood, the blood of the new and eternal covenant, which will be poured out for you and for many, for the forgiveness of sin." With these words Christ instituted the Sacrament of the Eucharist. Following the Apostles reception of what might be reckoned a "holy communion" for them, Christ commanded them to "Do this in remembrance of me." (1 Corinthians 11:25). With these words Christ instituted the Priesthood, and the Sacrament of Holy Orders. On that same night, Christ washes the feet of his Apostles (John 13:5-8) – a sign of service to the people of God. He tells his Apostles to do likewise: "What I have done for you, you should also do." (John 13:15).

After the Supper. After the Last Supper, Christ goes to the Garden of Gethsemane, to pray about what lay ahead for him; he commends his apostles, to wait outside of the garden. During his prayers he says, "Father, if you are willing, take this cup away from me; still, not my will but yours be done" (Matthew 26:39). Christ's pondering of what lay ahead of him was so intense that his "sweat became like drops of blood falling on the ground" (Luke 22:44). During His "agony in the garden" angels came to Christ to comfort Him in his time of need (Luke 22:43). Christ left that garden to begin his Passion.

Beyond the Garden. While he was at prayer, his disciples fell asleep. He chastised their weakness of spirit, "Could you not keep watch for one hour?" (Mark 14:37). Meanwhile, Judas and the plotters against Christ drew near. Judas kissed Christ on his cheek — a sign of fraternal care — to identify Christ to his detractors. Christ chastises Judas: "Judas, are you betraying the Son of Man with a kiss?" (Luke 22:48). The question was rhetorical; Christ was betrayed by one of

those closest to him. Some of Christ followers are riled up to the point that they start to fight against the authorities; Christ tells them, "Stop, no more of this!" (Luke 22:51). Christ is captured by the authorities and is tormented by his captors. He taken before Annas, a High Priest. Annas cannot get a confession out of Jesus, so "Annas sent him bound to Caiaphas the high priest." (John 18:24). Christ is taken before the Sanhedrin and Caiaphas. Caiaphas asks Christ if he is the Messiah, to which Christ responds, "You have said so." He is charged with Blasphemy and the Sanhedrin declares the Jesus is worthy of death (Matthew 26:57-66). Caiaphas then sent Christ to Pilate, the Roman Governor, whom had the authority to order an execution (John 18:31). Furthering Christ's suffering, Peter, the leader of his Apostles, denies Christ as he is questioned about knowing him. Peter weeps when he realizes that Christ predictions that he'd betray him came to pass (Luke 22:54-62).

Prayer for Thursday of Holy Week: O God, who have called us to participate in this most sacred Supper, in which your Only Begotten Son, when about to hand himself over to death, entrusted to the Church a sacrifice new for all eternity, the banquet of his love, grant, we pray, that we may draw from so great a mystery, the fullness of charity and of life. Through our Lord Jesus Christ, your Son, who lives and reigns with you in the unity of the Holy Spirit, God, for ever and ever. Amen.

GOOD FRIDAY. On Good Friday, in the morning, Judas - recognizing the weight of deeds hangs himself. Jesus is brought before Pilate, who finds him guilty of no crime. Pilate sends him to Herod who also had jurisdiction in this matter (Luke 23:6), who likewise finds no guilt in Jesus (Luke 23:15). Jesus is sent back to Pilate who ultimately finds Him innocent three different times (Luke 23:22). Amidst these trials, Jesus is scourged, spat upon, crowned with thorns and mocked by the people he came to save. Due to a custom, Pilate was able to allow the people in the crowd to release a prisoner from custody. Pilate gives the people the choice between releasing Barabbas, a murderer (Luke 23:18) or Jesus. The people release Barabbas, and Pilate agrees to allow Christ's execution on a Cross (Luke 23:23).

The Time of Morning. At about 9:00 a.m., Christ takes up his cross and makes the journey from the Palace of Pilate to the place of His crucifixion.

Or more correctly said, they were important to the parents and grandparents, more so. School aged children practiced the traditions because they were important to their parents and it was the way it always was. During my time there I saw the communities begin to dissipate, young adults were fleeing the neighborhoods and its traditions in favor of suburbia, the quiet tree-lined streets, where every house had a driveway and garage. The concrete pavements in the old neighborhoods were abandoned in favor of green grass and big back yards. And, sadly, abandoned too, oftentimes were the old traditions brought to this country by their parents, or grandparents before them.

One of my favorite stories is told in the movie, Fiddler On The Roof. Oddly enough it was the first movie I ever watched after my husband decided to bring cable television into our home almost thirty years ago. The movie depicts the breakdown of the community and family unit due to circumstances beyond the control of those affected by cruel outside influences. Their traditional practices, and determination to preserve them, however, are packed up with their meager belongings as they set out for a new world.

My maternal family members in part sailed to American shores on a boat set out from England in the very early 1900's In all honesty, the only real traditions practiced in my family, if any, were of the culinary variety. I suppose that was because of the similarity of the American and English cultures. Speculation, mere speculation on my part. My grandmother, born in the United States, held fast to her beliefs as an Episcopalian, and although a staunch Democrat, always maintained some allegiance to the concept of rule by a monarch. She and I enjoyed many a tea-party replete with fancy bone-china tea-cups. Lemon slices and a lighted candle were always placed on the table... and some sort of sweet nibble. To this very day my beverage of choice is a good hot cup of tea. A practice passed down by my grandmother, and her grandmother before her.

Lent and Easter are liturgical seasons when a family's traditional practices are often observed. Many of these customs have been preserved from the "old country" and will serve to enrich the ritual practices associated with the seasons. Permit me please to once again to summon up memories of my dear grandmother. She had a particular fondness for hot-cross buns. If it was Easter, by george, there were going to be hot-cross buns in the house. Most times they were ordered days ahead of time from the local bakery, but there were those special times when she and I prepared the recipe ourselves. Home-baked and enjoyed with melted butter and marmalade. Add a cup of hot tea, and there you have yourself a tradition! Simply stated, a hot cross bun is a spiced sweet bun usually made with dried fruit, raisins, or currents, marked with a simple white cross on the top. They have been traditionally eaten on Good Friday. The traditional recipe has its roots in the United Kingdom, and my grandmother learned to bake them from her mother.

And so, it wasn't too very long ago that I began thinking about those days in the kitchen with my grandmother. I toyed with thoughts of baking hot cross buns over our Easter holiday break, and I might. The modern bakery version just will not compare, if I could even find them.

I learned a great deal about cooking while working alongside my grandmother in the kitchen. There's a lot to learn. Measuring skills, appreciating the concept and meaning of a fraction, reading a recipe properly, safety with cooking tools, not to mention the opportunity to create lifelong memories.

I have a few websites you might reference for hot cross bun recipes and directions. Know ahead of time; it will probably take the better part of an afternoon, but the end results are well worth the time investment. And it's a sweet (literally) tradition to start with the family.

So how about donning the apron, pulling down the canister of flour, a great bit mixing bowl and get started on the recipe, just you and the kiddos? And, do not forget to fill the kettle!!

"...You may ask, how did this tradition start? I'll tell you - I don't know. But it's a tradition... Because of our traditions, Everyone knows who he is and what God expects him to do." We recount these steps during the first ten Stations of the Cross. At noon, Christ, after making the agonizing journey carrying His cross, reached the place of his death at the hill of Calvary. There he was nailed to the Cross; atop the cross Pilate placed an inscription: "Jesus the Nazorean, the King of the Jews." (John 19:19). Alongside Christ were two criminals, also being crucified (St. Dismas and Gestas). St. Dismas suffering alongside Christ, confesses his guilt and asks Christ, "Jesus, remember me when you come into your kingdom." Jesus responds, "Today you will be with me in paradise." (Luke 23:39-43). St. Dismas, for his faith in Christ, has become known as "The Good Thief." In a similar vein, as he was dying on the Cross, amidst the gathered crowd, Christ called upon his Father saying "Father, forgive them, they know not what they do." (Luke 23:34).

The Time of Mourning. As the hour of 3:00 p.m. arrived. Christ announces, "It is finished" (John 19:30) and "Father, into your hands I commend my spirit" (Luke 23:46). Then "Jesus gave a loud cry and breathed his last" (Mark 15:37). To make sure Jesus was dead, a Roman soldier pierced His side with a lance, and from that wound flowed blood and water. (John 19:34); the centurion then states, "Truly this man was the Son of God!" (Mark 15:39). Upon the death of Christ, the earth quaked (Matthew 27:51), breaching the veil of the Temple (Mark 15:38); reflecting the breach between God and man at this dark moment. His body is taken from the cross and laid into a stone-sealed tomb (Matthew 27:60). The women who abided with Christ "prepared spices and perfumed oils" for his burial. (Luke 23:56). Pilate ordered guards at the tomb to make sure His followers did not try to steal his body and claim "He has been raised from the dead.". So, the soldiers sealed the tomb so that it could not be opened. (Matthew 27:66).

Prayer for Friday of Holy Week: O God, who by the Passion of Christ your Son, our Lord, abolished the death inherited from ancient sin by every succeeding generation, grant that just as, being conformed by him, we have borne by the law of nature the image of the man of earth, so by the sanctification of grace we may bear the image of the Man of heaven. Through Christ our Lord. Amen.

And now, then comes Holy Saturday – a day for waiting. A day for reflecting. On this day, as one source writes: Mary and the disciples are grief-stricken, while the Church must mournfully admit that too many of her children return home from Calvary cold and hard of heart. When Mother Church reflects upon all of this, it seems as if the wounds of her dearly Beloved were again beginning to bleed... According to tradition, the entire body of the Church is represented in Mary... Thus, the Blessed Virgin Mary, as she waits near the Lord's tomb, as she is represented in Christian tradition, is an icon of the Virgin Church keeping vigil at the tomb of her Spouse while awaiting the celebration of his resurrection.

Prayer for the Saturday morning of Holy Week: All-powerful and ever-living God,

your only Son went down among the dead and rose again in glory. In your goodness raise up your faithful people, buried with him in baptism, to be one with him in the eternal life of heaven, where he lives and reigns with you and the Holy Spirit, one God, for ever and ever. Amen.

And for us, our patient and prayerful wait begins as we the Christian faithful look from the darkness of Good Friday, to wait, patiently and prayerfully the glory of events of Easter.
