Pastor's Desk

Dear Parishioners,

Recently, I was asked about the lengthy list of saint names that are read out during the Eucharistic prayer sometimes. The gist of the question was, "Why these saints? Why not St. Anthony or St. Dominic?" A good question; to answer it I dug and modified, something I wrote about 5-6 years ago for a presentation I did on the "Saints of the Roman Canon." In this bulletin and next, I'll be writing about this wonderful part of our Tradition.

The Fab Four. At Mass, there are four commonly used "Eucharistic Prayers" (prayers said during the consecration). The oldest continually used of these prayers is oft called "The Roman Canon." It's called this because this prayer features a list or "canon" of many early Roman saints. Why Roman saints? Because this was the prayer the Church of Rome used, so it used the saints best known to them. As Paul Simon famously recited the names of friends Jack, Stan, Roy, Gus, and Lee in his *Fifty Ways to Leave Your Lover* – because they played an important part in the song's story – so to the

Church, in its Roman Canon, names the names that are important to its (our) early history.

Listening to the Top 40 (and Mary). The list of Saints begins with Mary, who is Queen of all saints (and who could be the topic of a whole 'nother column). In this column, I will tell the stories of the 40 saints listed after Mary. (Note: except for St. Joseph, all these saints are some form of martyrs who have a connection to Apostolic tradition and Rome. The first 13 of these are:

1. St. Joseph. St. Joseph's connection to Rome is spiritual rather than an historical; he is the Patron Saint of the Universal Church which finds its home in Rome. He is the husband of Mary, the patron saint of a happy death, and the foster-father of our Lord Jesus Christ.

2. Peter (Apostle & Martyr): The first Pope and leader of the Apostles. Peter went to heart of the Empire, the city of Rome, and there he spread the Gospel and led the early Church. The Government authorities disdained him and he was

crucified upside down for his faith in Christ. Feast day: June 29.

3. Paul (Apostle & Martyr): Originally Paul was a persecutor of Christians, but had a famous conversion experience to the faith on the Road to Damascus. He wrote many Epistles (letters). In 67 A.D., Paul was beheaded for his faith; it is said his head bounced three times when cut off – a final prayer to the Trinity. Feast day: June 29 (Conversion of Paul: Jan. 25)

4. Andrew (Apostle & Martyr): The first Apostle called by Christ, he was a fisherman. After Christ died Andrew evangelized in what is today called Russia. He also preached in Asia Minor (Turkey), and Greece, where he is said to have been crucified on an “x” shaped cross. The Cross of St. Andrew – or *saltire* – can be seen on the flag of Scotland, a country for whom Andrew is the patron saint. Feast day: Nov. 30.

5. James (Apostle & Martyr): James was the son of Alpheus, and he is also one of two James's referred to in the Roman Canon. This James is sometimes referred to as James the Greater. He is said to have ministered in Syria. Tradition tells us that James was stoned and then clubbed to death for his faith. Feast day: July 25.

6. John (Apostle & White Martyr): St. John was the Church leader in Ephesus area (western Turkey), and is said to have taken care of Mary in his home. In late first century, John was exiled to the island of Patmos (near Greece). There, St. John wrote the Book of Revelation. As the authorities tried to kill him many times, he is called a “white martyr” because he was willing to shed his blood for Christ, but was spared a martyr’s death. Feast day: Dec. 27.

7. Thomas (Apostle & Martyr): This is the guy who doubted Christ was resurrected, but he became – without a doubt – one of the great Apostles. Following Christ’s ascension, St. Thomas began to spread the good news. Most famously, tradition says, St. Thomas brought the Gospel to India. Many Catholics in India revere St. Thomas as the founder of their nation’s Christian faith. Thomas was martyred for his faith; he was pierced through with the spears of four soldiers. Feast day: July 3.

8. James (Apostle & Martyr): This James, not to be confused with the previously referenced James, was the brother of St. Jude and a cousin of Jesus. This James is sometime called “James the Lesser” because he was younger

than the other James. St. James was the first Bishop of Jerusalem. He was later arrested by the Jewish authorities and suffered a martyr’s death by being tossed off the roof of the Great Temple of Jerusalem. Feast day: May 3.

9. Philip (Apostle & Martyr): St. Philip evangelized the people of Carthage in North Africa and later in Asia Minor (Turkey). For Philip, the good news was that Phillip successfully converted the wife of an important Roman leader to Christianity. The bad news is that the important Roman leader was not happy about this and had Philip arrested and put to death by torture. Feast day: May 3.

10. Bartholomew (Apostle & Martyr): This Apostle had engaged in missionary travels: to India with St. Thomas; he then to Armenia, Ethiopia and south Arabia. With journeys like these, many frequent flier miles could be earned in today’s world! St. Bartholomew died as a martyr by being skinned alive in Asia Minor (because of the manner of his martyrdom, he is the patron saint of tanners). Feast day: Aug. 25.

11. Matthew (Apostle & Martyr): Matthew, a former tax collector, wrote one of the Gospels in the New Testament. Following Christ’s ascension, Matthew continued Christ’s works: Evangelizing in Persia and Ethiopia. In varying accounts, Matthew was axed to death in northern Ethiopia or southern Egypt. He is the patron saint of Tax Collectors. Feast day: Sept. 21.

12. Simon (Apostle & Martyr): Oft called “Simon the Zealot” because he was a member of the Zealots – a movement in Israel that sought to expel the Roman Empire from Judea. Simon did his evangelical work in Persia, with St. Jude. While evangelizing, Simon was arrested for his faith and ordered to make sacrificial offerings to the pagan “sun god.” He refused and suffered a martyr’s death. Feast day: Oct. 28.

13. Jude (Apostle & Martyr): The brother of St. James the Lesser and cousin of Jesus, Jude wrote a short New Testament Epistle. People often pray to St. Jude as the patron saint for hopeless situations. Why is he connected to “hopeless” situations? Because his name sounded so much like “Judas” it was deemed hopeless that, as a saint, anyone would follow or pray to him. Tradition holds he was killed with arrows for refusing to deny his faith. Feast day: Oct. 28.


Marriage & Family Life Corner

COLUMNÁ DEL PÁRROCO PADRE JAMES LENTINI 12 DE FEBRERO, 2017.

Estimados feligreses,

Recientemente, me preguntaron acerca de la larga lista de nombres de santos que a veces se leen durante la Plegaria Eucarística, también llamada anáfora o canon, es la oración central de la Misa. La esencia de la pregunta era: "¿Por qué estos santos? ¿Por qué no San Antonio o Santo Domingo?" Una buena pregunta; Para contestarla, busqué y modifiqué, algo que escribí hace unos 5-6 años para una presentación que hice sobre los "Santos del Canon Romano". En este boletín y en el siguiente, escribiré sobre esta maravillosa parte de nuestra Tradición.

Los Cuatro Fabulosos. En la Misa, hay cuatro comúnmente usados "Plegarias Eucarísticas" (oraciones que se dicen durante la consagración). El más antiguo y continuamente utilizado de estas plegarias es a menudo llamado "El Canon Romano." Se llama esto porque esta oración cuenta con una lista o "canon" de primeros santos romanos. ¿Por qué los santos romanos? Debido a que esta fue la oración de la Iglesia de Roma, por lo que se utilizó a los santos más conocidos por ellos. Como dice Paul Simon famosamente recitó los nombres de sus amigos Jack, Stan, Roy, Gus y Lee en su canción "*Cincuenta maneras de dejar a Tu Amante*" - porque desempeñaron un papel importante en la historia de la canción - así también la Iglesia, en su Canon romano, son los nombres importantes para los comienzos su (nuestra) historia.

Escuchando A Los Primeros 40 (y María). La lista de los santos comienza con María, que es reina de todos los santos (y que podría ser el tema de toda una columna). En esta columna, voy a contar las historias de los 40 santos enumerados después de María. (Nota: *a excepción de San José, todos estos santos son en alguna forma mártires que tienen una conexión con la tradición apostólica y Romana.* Estos son los 13 primeros:

1. San José: La conexión de San José con Roma es más espiritual que histórica; Él es el Santo Patrón de la Iglesia Universal que encuentra su hogar en Roma. Es el esposo de María, patrón de los trabajadores y de una buena muerte, y el padre adoptivo de nuestro Señor Jesucristo.

2. Pedro (Apóstol y Mártir): El primer Papa y líder de los Apóstoles. Pedro fue al corazón del Imperio, la ciudad de Roma, y allí difundió el Evangelio y guió la Iglesia primitiva. Las autoridades gubernamentales lo desdeñaron y fue crucificado boca abajo por su fe en Cristo. Su Fiesta: 29 de junio.

3. Pablo (Apóstol y Mártir): Originalmente Pablo era un perseguidor de los cristianos, pero tuvo una famosa experiencia de conversión a la fe en el Camino a Damasco. Escribió muchas epístolas (cartas). En 67 A.D., Pablo fue decapitado por su fe; Se dice que su cabeza rebotó tres

veces cuando fue cortada - una oración final a la Trinidad. Fiesta: 29 de junio (La Conversión de Pablo: 25 de enero)

4. Andrés (Apóstol y Mártir): El primer apóstol llamado por Cristo, él era pescador. Después que murió Cristo, Andrés evangelizó en lo que hoy se llama Rusia. También predicó en Asia Menor (Turquía) y Grecia, donde se dice que fue crucificado en una cruz en forma de aspa, una "x". La cruz de San Andrés - o cruz de Borgoña - Este emblema ha sido incluido en los escudos de armas y en las banderas de España y en Escocia país para el cual Andrés es el santo patrón. Fiesta: 30 de noviembre.

5. Santiago (Apóstol y Mártir): Santiago era el hijo de Zebedeo, y él es también uno de los dos Santiago que se refiere en el Canon Romano. Este Santiago se refiere a veces como Santiago el Mayor. Se dice que ha ministrado en Siria. La tradición nos dice que Santiago fue apedreado y luego golpeado a muerte por su fe. Fiesta: 25 de julio.

6. Juan (Apóstol y Mártir Blanco): San Juan era el discípulo amado de Jesús líder de la iglesia en el área de Éfeso (Turquía occidental), y se dice que cuidó de María en su hogar. A finales del primer siglo, Juan fue exiliado a la isla de Patmos (cerca de Grecia). Allí, San Juan escribió el Libro del Apocalipsis. Como las autoridades trataron de matarlo varias veces, sin éxito se le llama "mártir blanco" porque estaba dispuesto a derramar su sangre por Cristo, pero se salvó de la muerte de un mártir. Fiesta: 27 de diciembre.

7. Tomás (Apóstol y Mártir): Este es el incrédulo, que dudaba de que Cristo fue resucitado, pero se convirtió sin duda, en uno de los grandes apóstoles. Después de la ascensión de Cristo, Santo Tomás comenzó a difundir las buenas nuevas. Lo más famoso, dice la tradición, Santo Tomás trajo el Evangelio a la India. Muchos católicos en la India veneran a Santo Tomás como el fundador de la fe cristiana de su nación. Tomás fue martirizado por su fe; Fue traspasado con las lanzas de cuatro soldados. Fiesta: 3 de julio.

8. Santiago (Apóstol y Mártir): Este Santiago, que no debe confundirse con el anteriormente referido Apóstol, hermano de San Judas y pariente de Jesús. Llamado "Santiago el menor" porque era más joven que el otro Santiago. Fue el primer obispo de Jerusalén y desarrolló una intensa actividad misionera. Murió mártir en Jerusalén. Santiago posteriormente fue arrestado por las autoridades judías y sufrió la muerte de un mártir al ser arrojado del techo del Gran Templo de Jerusalén. Fiesta: 3 de mayo.

9. Felipe (Apóstol y Mártir): San Felipe evangelizó a la gente de Cartago en el norte de África y más tarde en Asia Menor (Turquía). Para Felipe, la buena noticia fue que convirtió exitosamente a la esposa de un importante líder romano al cristianismo. La mala noticia es que el importante líder romano no estaba contento con esto y Felipe fue arrestado y condenado a muerte por tortura. Fiesta: 3 de mayo.

10. Bartolomé (Apóstol y Mártir): Este apóstol había emprendido viajes misioneros: a la India con Santo Tomás; Después a Armenia, Etiopía y a Arabia del Sur. Con viajes como estos, se podrían ganar muchas millas de viajero frecuente en el mundo de hoy! San Bartolomé murió como mártir al ser desollado vivo en Asia Menor (debido a la manera de su martirio, él es el santo patrón de los carníceros). Fiesta: 25 de agosto.

Mateo (Apóstol y Mártir): San Mateo, un ex recaudador de impuestos, escribió uno de los Evangelios en el Nuevo Testamento. Después de la ascensión de Cristo, Mateo continuó las obras de Cristo: Evangelizando en Persia y Etiopía. En distintos y variadas relatos, Mateo fue asesinado a muerte en el norte de Etiopía o el sur de Egipto. Él es el santo patrón de los recaudadores de impuestos. Fiesta: 21 de septiembre.

12. Simón (Apóstol y Mártir): Frecuentemente llamado "Simón el Zelote", porque era un miembro de los Zelotes - un movimiento en Israel que trató de expulsar el Imperio Romano de Judea. Simón hizo su trabajo evangelizadora en

Persia, con San Judas. Mientras evangelizaba, Simón fue arrestado por su fe y ordenado hacer ofrendas de sacrificio al pagano "dios sol". Él rechazó y sufrió la muerte de un mártir. Fiesta: 28 de octubre.

13. Judas Tadeo (Apóstol y Mártir): El hermano de Santiago el Menor y primo de Jesús, Judas escribió una breve Epístola del Nuevo Testamento. La gente suele rezarle a San Judas Tadeo como el santo patrón de situaciones difíciles o desesperadas. ¿Por qué está conectado a situaciones "sin esperanza"? Debido a que su nombre sonaba tanto como "Judas" se consideraba imposible que, como un santo, cualquiera lo seguiría o rezaría. La tradición sostiene que fue asesinado con flechas por no negar su fe. Fiesta: 28 de octubre.
