

Sacrament of Reconciliation (Confession).

Children in our religious education program and school are prepared for Confession at age seven as part of First Communion preparation.

Sacrament of the Holy Eucharist. Children in our religious education program and school are prepared for First Communion at age seven. Adults seeking First Communion should contact our Religious Education Office. To request a visitation for Holy Communion to the Sick, contact our parish office.

Sacrament of Confirmation. Young people in our parish are prepared for reception of Confirmation in the ninth grade (age 14). Adults seeking Confirmation should contact our Religious Education Office.

Dear Parishioners,

This Pastor's Column will be in two parts — the first focusing on the Epiphany of our Lord and the second focusing on some of the forgotten saints of Christmas.

The King Thing. In countries where a King is the sovereign leader, people are subjects to the monarch. England, would be an example of that: England has a monarch (King Charles III) – and the residents of Great Britain are not citizens, they are subjects. As it was in Christ's time, so it is still with monarchies today: When the Monarch has a child, a proclamation goes out declaring the birth of the child, declaring his given name. Then the child is presented to the King (his father) and then to the other members of the royal family and the Lords, and then finally – last on the list – to the people of the Kingdom.

Who's on First. The Epiphany of our Lord, is a reflection of that monarchical tradition, but with one drastic change: When Christ was born in Bethlehem, a proclamation did indeed go out about his birth, as it would with any royal birth. But the first people to be invited to see this newborn child – the first to whom he'd be revealed – were not the royalty of the day; nor the landowners nor the bigwigs. Nope! It was the shepherds, the common folk who were the first to see this royal child. A complete reversal of royal traditions.

And Finally... After the common folk of the world gazed upon the face of their savior, their Lord, then and only then, did the royalty of the world gets a glimpse of this wonder-counselor, this prince of peace. The Kings are among the last to come to that stable and see the child in the manger - on the day we celebrate today, the Epiphany. But this visitation by the three Kings is still very significant. Their visit represents Christ being made known to the several corners of the world. The word Epiphany itself means "manifestation" - that is, a making known. Once the Kings knew, all the nations knew -Christ was light to be light to all nations. This visit all represents all the kingdoms of the world being made subject to a new king. A king to whom other kings will bow down: A king not born in the trappings of royalty, but in the abject poverty of a stable barely fit for animals.

Three Kings, Three Gifts. And what do these three kings – traditionally known as Melchior, Casper and Balthazaar – bring the new born King. They bring, the same things that we should bring Him.

• King Melchior is said to have brought gold. This is to symbolize the recognition of Christ's royalty, his kingship. Walls of the ancient temples were often lined with gold, as were the palaces of the kings who were often thought of as connected to God somehow. And at Mass, the body and blood Christ is placed on a paten (plate) and in a chalice made not of clay, not of glass but of very often made of gold –

a noble metal fit for a king. And we should be bring him gold also. That is to say, we should bring him our recognition of his status as our Lord, our Savior, our King and our God.

- King Caspar is said to have given frankincense. Frankincense is a type of incense that comes from the sap of trees found in Persia, it was used for centuries before Christ as a fragrance offered to God in worship. And so, this fragrance usually offered to God alone, is offered today to this child, recognizing that he is no ordinary child, but rather he is a child worthy of worship and adoration – he is God among us. He is one whose sweetness will pale, the sweetness of the frankincense. And we too, like the Kings, should offer to God that which is proper to God, our heavenly King like faith, trust, adoration, and love. The incense of our sweet prayers should always rise up to our sweet Lord.
- King Balthazar is said to have brought myrrh in a jeweled cup. Myrrh was a type of an embalming scent used to prepare the dead. This would be an odd gift to give a new born; but this gift was a foreshadowing of the coming death of this child, a death prepared for by this gift at the time of his birth a redemptive death that would give new life to us. And we too, like the Kings should bring to Christ the myrrh of our recognition of His value and the redeeming power of His death and resurrection. We should be prepared to die with Christ, die to ourselves take on that aroma of myrrh and therein rise with him.

Star Gazing. Even today these gifts given to Christ should be remembered for their significance in Christ's Epiphany –his being made known to the world. These gifts given by Kings to a King recognized the royal nature of our Savior. Let us be like these three wise men, these three kings, lets follow the star – that is the light of Christ, and be willing to offer our recognition of who this child is , who this Jesus Christ is, who this Savior is. He is the one and the only Savior of mankind. There is no other. And in the spirit of Epiphany, let's leave church today and not be afraid to let the world know that.

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The Forgotten Saints of Christmas. With Christmas Season ending tomorrow (January 9, with the Feast of the Baptism of the Lord), let's flashback to December 25 – the start of the Christmas season. I often note that St. Anastasia, who is mentioned dur-

There are actually 19 saints (including one group of Martyrs) who are observed on that day. Each of these holy men and women have their feast day on December 25 and, thus, are often overlooked in the annals of Christendom. As we end the season of Christmas, I want to highlight the lives of four of these 19 saints and take you beyond the Christmas tree!

St. Anastasia: Burning Love. St. Anastasia's story is mainly relayed to us from the ancient writings called the Acts of Saint Chrysogonus the Martyr. Of noble birth, she was widowed young, and spent her time and money assisting persecuted Christians. While visiting St. Chrysogonus, a priest imprisoned for practicing his faith, she was likewise imprisoned. Under Roman Emperor Diocletian's harsh decrees against Christians, St. Anastasia, who would not recant her faith, was taken to a nearby island and was burned alive for being a Christian. The Church of Sant'Anastasia al Palatino (in Rome) was dedicated in her honor in the fourth century. Until the mid-1960s, St. Anastasia was commemorated during the Christmas Mass at Dawn, each Christmas Day. St. Anastasia, pray for us.

Gee, It's Quiet! Bl. Bentivoglio de Bonis was born in 1188 in San Severino Marche, Italy. For those fans of Medaglia d'Oro coffee, you will note that like the "g" in Medaglia, the "g" in Bentivoglio is silent. Imagine, a silent "g" -- we'd never do such a thing in English, RIGHT? Anyway, Bl. Bentivoglio became a fervent disciple of St. Francis, and became one of first -- if not the first -- Franciscan Priests. He was model of humility, obedience and charity. Once, when inflamed by the Holy Spirit while preaching to the people, it is said that a luminous star appeared in his forehead that made his whole-body shimmer and shine with pure light. Many miracles and many conversions were attributed to him. He passed from this life on December 25, 1232 and won his Medaglia d'Oro (Gold Medal) from God, and now shares eternity with the saints in Heaven. Bl. Bentivoglio, pray for us.

Incensed by Incense. At Nicomedia, several thousand of the faithful had gathered for Mass on the day of our Lord's Nativity. Christian-hating Roman Emperor Diocletian heard about this gathering and ordered that the doors of the Church to be closed, and fire to be kindled around the building. He then placed vessel filled with incense at the entranceway where wishing to escape the burning Church, would be forced to offer incense to Roman god Jupiter, in order to be allowed to leave in safety. All the Christian present shouted with one voice that they preferred to die for Christ, then worship a false god. And on that December 25, 304, those Christian martyrs were born into heaven on the anniversary of the day Christ was born into the world. Holy Martyrs of Nicomedia, pray for us.

A Man called "Crazy Jim" (This is Not Autobiographical). St. Jacopone started out as a decadent, wealthy, and worldly man named Jacamo. He was married to a holy woman named Vanna (though this one did not turn letters on Wheel of Fortune). Vanna had always prayed that one day Jacamo would abandon his worldly ways. Following death in an accident, Jacamo vowed to honor her wishes, giving up his wealth and becoming a beggar. His friends nicknamed him "Jacopone" (meaning "Crazy Jim"). He later joined the Franciscan order, living an life of poverty. He would spend his final years writing Latin hymns; the most famous of which is the "Stabat Mater" (sung during the Stations of the Cross). He died December 25, 1306, during Midnight Mass. Whether or not his envelope made it into the collection basket, only the Franciscans know for sure! St. Jacopone, pray for us.

So, as we wrap up this Christmas season, let's take a moment to remember those holy men and women blessed to share a sacred day with the Lord whom they loved so very much. Saints of Christmas Day, pray for us!
