Dear Parishioners,

This weekend our nation celebrates the 247th anniversary of its self-declared independence. Our nation was and is unique in world history – it is not a nation based on ethnic identity, but rather a nation based on a creedal set of beliefs. Those beliefs were built around religious freedom and acknowledgement of the God who is the author of life. Our nation was founded very much as a nation with Christian underpinnings. Not a nation with a state religion, but a nation guided by and ungirded by the Christian tenets of its people; it continued on that basis for over 200 years.

I Do Declare. On July 4th, 1776, 56 men gathered to sign the Declaration of Independence. Of those 56, only one was a Catholic (that wasn't so much anti-Catholic bigotry as much as it was that Catholicism was a very small percentage of the American population at that time). In any event, that one signer of the Declaration of Independence was a man named Charles Carroll. And on this weekend leading to Independence Day, a day of American patriotic fervor, celebration and remembrance, I want to make mention about this early Catholic patriot.

Before EZ Pass. Born on September 19, 1837, in Maryland, in the years before EZ Pass and Bay Bridge traffic, Charles Carroll was raised in a Catholic family. As neither Holy Cross nor Immaculate Conception Parishes were been built yet, Carroll attended a secret Jesuit school in Maryland's Cecil County on the eastern shore (for those who are not sure where Cecil County is, it is the county with the outlet stores and the casino). Carroll then was then sent to Europe for his secondary and postsecondary education, receiving a law degree in London.

Field of Endeavor. Upon returning back "across the pond" to the colonies, he found that as a Catholic in the Maryland colony, he was banned from voting, he was banned from holding elective office and he was banned from practicing law. Undaunted, he turned his intellect and his entrepreneurial spirit towards agriculture and became vastly successful, dare I say, in that field. He then engaged in other business interests on Maryland's other shore.

Tea Time. By the time the 1770s rolled around, Carroll found himself as a leading advocate for American independence. I would say that if Twitter was around back then, Carroll would have been using hash tag #Britaingetout. In 1774, he was scurrilously involved in the burning of a ship called the Peggy Stewart, which was carrying tea to Maryland ports (this was part and parcel of that Boston Tea Party movement of the era). After turning the Chesapeake Bay into the biggest cup of Lipton Tea in history, he continued to lecture and debate on the matter of American Independence. Ultimately, Charles Carroll advocated war —a just war at that — with the British. He saw this as a just action to gain independence.

ence (and as we all learned in history class, this is ultimately what occurred).

A Sign(er) of the Times. On July 4th, 1776, Carroll signed the Declaration of Independence. On a note of trivia - and I love trivia - he went on to become the last-living signer of the Declaration, passing from this life in 1832. It is claimed by some, that our First Amendment (guaranteeing Freedom of Religion) was written into the Constitution in consideration of the aid and support of Charles Carroll – and other like-minded Catholics – given to the American Revolutionary War efforts. Carroll later became a legislator in Maryland; in that role he, in later years, sponsored a bill in the Maryland legislature calling for the gradual abolition of slavery. While the bill failed, it garnered support from what would be become the Abolitionist movement in Maryland. He later went on to be the first U.S. Senator from Maryland.

Lessons and Carrolls. A lesson to learn is that great faith often runs in families. St. Augustine and St. Monica were mother and son. St. Benedict and St. Scholastica were brother and sister, St Gregory. and St. Basil were brothers as were St. Cyril and St. Methodius (brothers). While not saints, the Carroll family has two famous faithful members. Thus, I would be remiss if I failed to mention that Charles Carroll's cousin, John Carroll, went on to become the first Bishop from the United States – Archbishop John Carroll of what is today called the Archdiocese of Baltimore.

Charles in Charge. The reason I repeat the story of and sing -- or dare I say Carroll – the praises of this lone Catholic signer of the Declaration of Independence, is to show the affect that one person can have by visibly living his faith. In a colonial nation where Catholicism was persecuted and even made illegal in some places, Charles Carroll stated his faith and beliefs publicly. His values and his words may not have been popular, but they were nonetheless heard and given consideration. And obviously they had an effect, especially in the realm of Religious Freedom. He took charge of the issue of living one's faith in society, and here in the newly minted United States, he was a trailblazer.

A Lot of Faith. At Mass on Tuesday, if using the standard setting for the Tuesday of the 13th Week in Ordinary Time, one will hear Psalm 26. That Psalm as intoned by King David, the Psalmist, says, "I walk in integrity; redeem me, and have mercy on me. My foot stands on level ground." That is perhaps poetic way of saying, I'm standing for what is right and just, and God has my back. Likewise, on

We hold these truths to be self-evident, that all men are created equal, that they are endowed by their Creator with certain unalienable Rights, that among these are Life, Liberty and the pursuit of Happiness. Preamble to the Declaration of Independence

An established and well-founded "system" of education during eighteenth century America might best be characterized as one built with parental support and involvement with small family-based school settings. For many reasons, they were far more prominent than any formal settings established by governmental administration. No historian am I, but it almost sounds like the earliest schools were akin to the modern-day concept of what we view as home-schooling. Families and small communities lead efforts to create learning opportunities for their children. At the insistence of the Puritans, literacy was strongly emphasized in the effort to prepare and enable the reading and understanding of scripture. Over time, eighteenth century curriculum was greatly expanded with the European model acting as a guide in its formation.

Without getting too heavily enmeshed in the intricacies of the history and development of formal education in America, I thought it might be appropriate to have a look at some of the thoughts and opinions of our founding forefathers on the need for and the state of the eighteenth-century educational system on this the upcoming 247th anniversary of the Declaration of Independence. The Revolutionary period in American history is one of my favorites, so I have sited a couple of the more influential historical figures of that era. Please note that any spelling, grammar, or punctuation errors are the original errors of the historical figure. I include them for the purpose of authenticity.

John Adams: Quite the learned man, Mr. Adams excelled in his academics. His favorite subjects were science and mathematics, and with the assistance of his favorite instructor, Harvard Professor John Winthrop, Adams distinguished himself from his contemporaries. Mr. Adams' had a deep affection for books, and as a student at Harvard, he was rarely to be found without a book in hand. He maintained a love of learning for the whole of his life.

Benjamin Franklin: Although Mr. Franklin did not have the benefit of a college education due to the financial burden it posed for his family, he believed it was of the utmost importance for colonial Americans to receive a formal education. Along with others who shared the Enlightenment ideals of reason and free inquiry, he also held the opinion that moral virtue was formed through the acquiring of a formal education.

- "An investment in knowledge pays the best interest."
- "The only thing that is more expensive than education is ignorance,"

Thomas Jefferson: It was some years prior to his penning of the nation's Declaration of Independence, Thomas Jefferson enrolled at the College of William and Mary in Virginia where Mr. Jefferson's course of study included physics, meta-physics, and mathematics, along with rhetoric, logic, and ethics.

- "Nothing can stop the man with the right mental attitude from achieving his goal; nothing on earth can help the man with the wrong mental attitude."
- 'I think by far the most important bill in our whole code is that for the diffusion of knowlege among the people. no other sure foundation can be devised for the preservation of freedom, and happiness."

George Washington: Unlike many of his peers, the nation's first President never received a formal education. Early on in life, the death of his father caused the need for his family to restrict funds thus prohibiting him from attending an educational institution. As an alternative, he assisted his mother on the farm and attended a local school in Fredericksburg, VA. Throughout the rest of his life, Washington supplemented his education with reading and self-guided study.

- "To encourage literature and the arts is a duty which every good citizen owes to his country."
- "The investigation of mathematical truths accustoms the mind to method and correctness in reasoning, and is an employment peculiarly worthy of rational beings."

I wonder what words of wisdom our forefathers might offer on the current state of the American educational system. I wonder what words of advice they might offer for modern-day American youth. I wonder what they might think of the twists and turns taken in the formation of the present-day curriculum of American schools.

Dismay and astonishment are two words that come to mind that might fitfully describe their reaction to the current state of American education 247 years following our Declaration of Independence. I believe their sage advice and wise counsel would encourage parents towards the precepts and teachings of the Catholic school in America.

In conclusion, extracted from a document entitled "On the Mode of Education Proper in a Republic," authored by American statesman, physician, deeply committed to the revolutionary cause, and signer of the Declaration of Independence, Benjamin Rush in 1798: "the only foundation for a useful education in a republic is to be laid in Religion. Without this there can be no virtue, and without virtue there can be no liberty, and liberty is the object and life of all republican governments."

Thank you, Mr. Rush. Very well said.

Tuesday, in the first reading, Lot and his family are protected by the Lord, and spared the fate of those in Sodom and Gomorrah, spared "the rain sulfurous fire" that destroyed two godless cities in which people shunned righteousness and justice for their own debased pleasures. Lot and his lot —like Charles Carroll and his likeminded country men— led with their faith, with their footing on level ground. They both forged their way to new lands, and they both strived to see a nation built on righteous, on justice and on pre-eminent place of God in society, with one's faith as the bulwark against the evil that men do.

Catholics Need Not Apply? Well, jumping from the Old Testament, to 1776, and then to today, it would certainly seem that in our nation today, the faith lived by Lot, and the faith propounded by Charles Carroll, is under continuous attack and that religion as a whole seems to be becoming marginalized. As one journalist I read noted, we are coming dangerously close to seeing the Government hold the position that when it comes to holding office, Catholics need not apply. Could that be the future for Catholics and committed Christians in our nation? Perhaps.

Of Winter Holidays and Egg Hunts. As Christ is erased from our nation's history, as Christmas is relegated to a winter holiday, and Easter to an egg hunt. As Christians are told to keep their values out of the public square, out of the courts, out of the halls of power, out of our schools, and simply put, out of sight, the possibility of our nation becoming something other than what Charles Carroll signed us up for, is made more possible.

Fear Not. At times, for us, living in a society at times so at odds with our faith, there is a natural temptation for some to prefer to retreat, rather than confront, and to practice our religion in private and in secret (like Charles Carroll had to do in his younger years in a secretly operated Catholic school). But Charles Carroll gives us an example of faithful citizenship: To fight that good fight, and make the teachings of Jesus Christ known, not just in our Church building and in our living room, but in the public square, in the halls of Government, and in the courtroom. And we should not fear, as Christ tells his followers so often!

Sweet Freedom. And our Lord is with us. He not only blesses our nation, but blesses each of us individually with rights endowed by Him. Our nation, in its battle for independence, sought freedom, and saw that freedom as God-given. That sense of freedom, and what freedom entailed, later found prose form in our Constitution's Bill of Rights. The first of the many God-given freedoms enshrined in that document was our Freedom of Religion which was expressed in 16 powerful words: "Congress shall make no law respecting an establishment of religion, or prohibiting the free exercise thereof."

Slouching Toward Gomorrah? Let me be clear, the words of this Amendment speak to, not a citizen's freedom from religion, but rather a religious establishment's freedom to preach and practice its faith unencumbered by the hand of Government. It is an implicit statement recognizing the value our nation's founders placed on religious freedom to witness and worship our "Creator" and "Divine Providence" (as God is called in the Declaration of Independence). It is a freedom that is imperiled by a society more taken by bread and circus, than Divine providence; as a society, we are slouching toward Gomorrah. But it is time to change course.

God Bless America. So, on this Independence Day weekend 2023, I commend you to pray for our nation, that God might continue to bless America, and that we may continue to make Christ and his Church known to all, in season and out -- as an unfettered and religiously free people. Let us, on this Independence Day, celebrate our independence as a nation that celebrates its dependence on God. In the normative first reading for today from Genesis, in the wake of the destruction of Sodom and Gomorrah, God tells Abraham that if he remains faithful to Him, that "I will bless you abundantly, and make your descendants as countless as the stars of the sky and the sands of the seashore; your descendants shall take possession of the gates of their enemies, and in your descendants all the nations of the earth shall find blessing -- all this because you obeyed my command." That promises extends to us, through the covenant sealed in the blood of Christ.

And so, let us make ourselves worthy of the promises of Christ, by heeding God's admonition to Abraham to remain faithful. In doing so, we to rightly can seek God's blessing. May God bless America, always and keep our nation imbued with Christian values as mankind last best hope! On this Independence Day, on this Fourth of July, let's do Charles Carroll proud!
