Dear Parishioners,

Numbers: They quantify (e.g., 12 in a dozen) and identify (e.g., he's 6th from the left) for us. They are part of our language and often carry meanings beyond their quantification and identification value. Thus, we know 13 is "bad luck," 666 is the mark of the beast, three is a crowd and seven is counted the perfect number. On TV we recall some numbers, too: "77 Sunset Strip," "90210," "60 Minutes," "30 Rock," and "227." Paul Simon enumerated the "50 Ways to Leave Your Lover," while rock band Chicago announced the time as being "25-or-6 to 4." And we all know what the IRS' 1040 is during tax season, we gamble on a 50/50 raffle, we grab a Slurpee at the 7-11, we love the adventures of .007, and we know Ivory Soap is 99.44/100% pure.

However, as we enter the season of Lent, we have another number in mind, a spiritual one: 40. That number, 40, is so very much associated with Lent, that in Latin, the official language of Catholicism, the season is called "Quadragesima," which means "40th"

as in 40th day until Easter. From this Latin word, many romance languages derive their name for Lent: in Spanish Lent is called "Cuaresma" and in Italian "Quaresima."

What's up with 40? So, why 40? Why not 50 days or 60 days or perhaps 33 days? Well, the number 40 has a special place in salvation history – and that number occurs repeatedly through the Scriptures. If I had to specify what the commonality of all of the Biblical references to the number 40 is, I'd have to say that it speaks to an amount necessary to accomplish a part of God's plan. In some cases, it also carries the sense of being a period of testing.

Forty-fied Biblical History

So, where in the Bible are those many 40s of which I spoke? Let's step into the Wayback Machine and set the dial to the time of Noah, and from there we will work forward in time. On this basis we will examine those funky 40s of the Bible.

- In Genesis, God spares Noah and his family during

the cleansing of the earth by the great flood caused by a rainstorm of 40 days and 40 nights. After those 40 days, life began anew for the faithful on the ark.

- In Exodus, Moses led the Jewish people out of Egypt, with the destination being the Promised Land. Fast forward, 40 years later they finally got there. This was a 40-year period that served to both test the faith of Moses and his people and re-establish the chosen people in the land given them by God. Perhaps it took 40 years to get from Egypt to Israel was because as a man, Moses refused to stop and ask directions.
- Also, in Exodus 34:28, we learn that Moses spent 40 days with God on Mt. Sinai. It was at the end of this 40-day period that we, by way of Moses, received the Ten Commandments.
- In Deuteronomy, forty is noted as the acceptable amount of punishment by whipping (40 lashes).
- In Judges, we are told that a judge named Abdon had 40 sons (12:14). Now, this would certainly beat out the number of kids in the cast of the "Brady Bunch" and "Eight is Enough" by a large stretch. As I mentioned, one of the aspects of the number 40 in scripture is that it can portend a testing of a person. I have to imagine that having 40 kids would be quite a test.
- Then in Judge 13:1, the Israelites "did what was evil in the sight of the LORD, who therefore delivered them into the power of the Philistines for forty years." Much like the 40 lashes mentioned in Deuteronomy, it was deemed that 40 was the proper number for years of punishment due. And this really was a punishment, because the Philistines were, well, Philistines. It would be like being sent to live under the rule of Californians for 40 years – I know, I know... it gave me a shudder up my spine, too.
- King Saul, King David and King Solomon each ruled Israel for 40 years.
- In the Book of the Prophet Jonah, God gave the people of Nineveh 40 days to repent from their sins. This Biblical story speaks very clearly to our

idea of the 40 days of Lent being used as a time to turn back to God.

- In the First Book of Kings, an angel tells Elijah that he must eat and drink to have strength for the journey he was on. He did so, and was able to continue his trek for 40 days. Holy Gatorade, Batman! That's a show of hearing and heeding God's message that can prepare one for endurance.

Meanwhile in the New Testament

Mary carried Jesus in her womb from the Annunciation until Christmas – 40 weeks.

- Jesus fasted for 40 days and nights in the desert, in preparation for his public ministry. During that time, he was tempted by the Devil, but nonetheless fended off those temptations (FYI: in the Scripture, Christ spoke exactly 40 words in rebuke of the Devil!) It is Christ's 40 days in the desert that we most closely relate to the season of Lent. The Church teaches us in the Catechism of the Catholic Church #540 this is, in fact, basis of the Season of Lent: "By the solemn forty days of Lent the Church unites herself each year to the mystery of Jesus in the desert"
- We read in the Acts of the Apostles, that after his resurrection from the dead, Jesus remained on earth for 40 more days before Ascending to Heaven.

There are many, many other Biblical references to the number 40. However, the ones that I listed are well known, and express that sense that the number carries a sense of 40 representing an amount of time needed to accomplish what God requires of us or a sense of a time of testing. And so, for us this Lent, the Church in its holy wisdom gives us 40 days to accomplish what God requires of us (turning back to him wholeheartedly, strengthening one's faith, resisting evil) and, indeed, it can be understood as a time of testing of faith and devotion. There are 40 days this Lenten season, use them well.

COLUMNAS DEL PÁRROCO PADRE JAMES LENTINI 10 DE MARZO, 2019.

Queridos feligreses,

Números: cuantifican (*por ejemplo, 12 en una docena*) e identifican (*por ejemplo, él es el sexto de la izquierda*) para nosotros. Son parte de nuestro lenguaje y, a menudo, tienen significados que van más allá de su valor de cuantificación e identificación. Por lo tanto, sabemos que 13 es "mala suerte", 666 es la marca de la bestia, tres es una multitud y siete es el número perfecto. En la televisión también recordamos algunos números: "77 Sunset Strip", "90210", "60 Minutos", "30 Rock" y "227." Paul Simon enumeró las "50 maneras de dejar a tu amante", mientras que la banda de rock Chicago anunció el tiempo como "25 o 6 a 4." Y todos conocemos la forma 1040 del IRS durante la temporada de impuestos, apostamos en una rifa 50/50, tomamos un Coca en el 7/11, Me encantan las aventuras de .007, y sabemos que el jabón Ivory es 99.44 / 100% puro.

Sin embargo, cuando entramos en el tiempo de la Cuaresma, tenemos otro número en mente, uno espiritual: 40. Ese número, 40, está tan asociado con la Cuaresma, que en latín, el idioma oficial del catolicismo, el tiempo se llama "Cuadragésima", que significa "40 °" como en 40 días hasta la Pascua. De esta palabra latina, muchos idiomas románticos derivan su nombre es donde proviene en español Cuaresma en italiano "Quaresima".

¿Qué Pasa Con 40? Entonces, ¿por qué 40? ¿Por qué no 50 días o 60 días o quizás 33 días? Bueno, el número 40 tiene un lugar especial en la historia de la salvación, y ese número aparece repetidamente a través de las Escrituras. Si tuviera que especificar cuáles son las características comunes de todas las referencias bíblicas al número 40, tendría que decir que habla de la cantidad necesaria para cumplir una parte del plan de Dios. En algunos casos, también conlleva la sensación de ser un período de prueba.

Cuarenta en Historia Bíblica

Entonces, ¿en qué parte de la Biblia están esos tantos 40 de los que hablé? Entremos en la Máquina del baúl de los recuerdos y configuremos el dial a tiempo de Noé, y desde allí trabajaremos hacia adelante en tiempo. Sobre esta base examinaremos los 40 de la Biblia.

- En Génesis, Dios perdonó a Noé y su familia durante la limpieza de la tierra por la gran

inundación causada por una tormenta de 40 días y 40 noches. Después de esos 40 días, la vida comenzó de nuevo para los fieles en el arca.

- En Éxodo, Moisés sacó al pueblo judío de Egipto, con el destino siendo la Tierra Prometida. Avance rápido, 40 años después, finalmente llegaron allí. Este fue un período de 40 años que sirvió para poner a prueba la fe de Moisés y su pueblo y restablecer al pueblo elegido en la tierra que Dios les dio. Tal vez tardó 40 años en llegar de Egipto a Israel, por un hombre, Moisés, que se negó a detenerse y preguntar por direcciones.

- Además, en Éxodo 34,28, aprendemos que Moisés pasó 40 días con Dios en el monte Sinaí. Fue al final de este período de 40 días que nosotros, a través de Moisés, recibimos los Diez Mandamientos.

- En Deuteronomio,25;3, cuarenta se anota como la cantidad aceptable de castigo por latigazos (40 azotes).

- En Jueces, se nos dice que un juez llamado Abdón tuvo 40 hijos (12,14). Ahora, esto ciertamente superaría la cantidad de niños en el elenco de "Brady Bunch" y "Ocho es suficiente" por un montón. Como mencioné, uno de los aspectos del número 40 en las Escrituras es que puede predecir la prueba de una persona. Tengo que imaginar que tener 40 hijos sería toda una prueba

- Luego, en el Juez 13: 1, los israelitas "volvieron a hacer lo que era malo a los ojos del SEÑOR, quien los entregó al poder de los filisteos por cuarenta años". Al igual que los 40 azotes mencionados en Deuteronomio, se consideró que 40 era el número apropiado para años de castigo merecidos. Y esto realmente fue un castigo, porque los filisteos eran, bueno, por decir, filisteos. Sería como ser enviado a vivir bajo el gobierno de los californianos durante 40 años; lo sé, lo sé ... también me dio un escalofrío en la espina dorsal.

- El Rey Saúl, el rey David y el rey Salomón gobernaron a Israel durante 40 años.

- En el Libro del profeta Jonás, Dios le dio a la gente de Nínive 40 días para que se arrepintieran de sus pecados. Esta historia bíblica habla muy claramente de nuestra idea de que los 40 días de la Cuaresma se usan como un tiempo para volver a Dios.

- En el Primer Libro de los Reyes, un ángel le dice a Elías que debe comer y beber para tener fuerzas para el viaje en que se encontraba. Comió por 40 días, y pudo continuar su caminata durante 40 días. Bendito Gatorade, Batman! Esa es una muestra de escuchar y prestar atención al mensaje

de Dios que puede prepararle a uno para la resistencia.

Mientras tanto en el Nuevo Testamento

María llevó a Jesús en su vientre desde la Anunciación hasta la Navidad - 40 semanas.

- Jesús ayunó por 40 días y noches en el desierto, en preparación para su ministerio público. Durante ese tiempo, fue tentado por el diablo, pero, sin embargo, se defendió de esas tentaciones (FYI: ¡en la Escritura, Cristo habló exactamente 40 palabras para reprender a Satanás!). Es en los 40 días de Cristo en el desierto que nos relacionamos más estrechamente. El tiempo de la Cuaresma. La Iglesia nos enseña en el Catecismo de la Iglesia Católica # 540 que esta es, de hecho, la base de la Temporada de Cuaresma: "Para los solemnes cuarenta días de Cuaresma, la Iglesia se une todos los años, durante los 40 días de la Cuaresma al misterio de Jesús en el desierto".

- Leemos en los Hechos de los Apóstoles, que después de su resurrección de entre los muertos, Jesús permaneció en la tierra por 40 días más antes de Ascender al Cielo.

Hay muchas, muchas otras referencias bíblicas al número 40. Sin embargo, las que enumeré son bien conocidas y expresan que el número conlleva un sentido de 40 que representa una cantidad de tiempo necesario para cumplir lo que Dios requiere de nosotros o un sentido de un tiempo de prueba. Y así, para nosotros esta Cuaresma, la Iglesia en su santa sabiduría nos da 40 días para cumplir lo que Dios requiere de nosotros (volviéndonos a El de todo corazón, fortaleciendo nuestra fe, resistiendo el mal) y, de hecho, puede entenderse como un momento de prueba de la fe y la devoción. Hay 40 días en este tiempo de la Cuaresma, aprovéchalo.
