Dear Parishioners,

One of the Gospels of the season of Lent that really encapsulates this season of repentance and forgiveness is the famous Gospel parable of the Prodigal Son. I want to use this Pastor's Column to reflect on that famous Gospel parable as a form of a Lenten reflection.

Here's the Story. You all know the story: A man has two sons – one younger, one older (well, yeah, obviously). In any event, the younger son asks his father for his inheritance early, he takes the money, wastes it profligately being prodigal, and finds himself in a strange land (hungry and sad). He decides to go back home, throw himself at his father's feet and apologize for what he did, and seeks to be taken back. Famously, the father, seeing the boy in the distance making his way back home, goes to meet him - and with the expression of repentance made by the boy, the father forgives him. He doesn't just forgive him, he celebrates his home coming with a great feast. The boy's brother, seeing all this, going into angst ridden Jan Brady mode, complains that while his prodigal brother was out gallivanting and squandering his inheritance, he had remained at home and tended to the needs of the father and their land. He laments basically (and I paraphrase here), "Where's my feast? I was a dutiful son. Where is my feast?" The father says, "My son, you are here with me always; everything I have is yours. But now we must celebrate and rejoice, because your brother was dead and has come to life again; he was lost and has been found." In other words, the biggest joy comes from bringing one of the faithful back into the fold — saving someone's soul. It is a joy worthy of a feast.

Bill Collectors? So, what are we to make of this beautiful parable in our own lives? Well, to that end, I will start with another story. Ponder this: what is the difference between a crisp \$20 bill and a soiled and rumpled \$20 bill? The story is told of a preacher who showed his congregation a crisp \$20 bill and asked who wants it. All hands went up. Then he crumpled it in his palms and asked who still wanted it. Again all hands went up. Lastly he threw it on the ground, marched on it and repeated his question. Still the hands went up. Then he explained to them that the difference between a new, crisp \$20 bill and a rumpled and soiled \$20 in our eyes is the difference between a good person and a bad person in the sight of God. Both are equally acceptable. Basically both stand equal before God "since all have sinned

and fall short of the glory of God" (Romans 3:23). Or as Spiritual writer Henri Nouwen put it, from a different vantage point: "We are all handicapped; some are more visibly handicapped than others."

Meanwhile Back at the Ranch. Let us get back, now, into the realm of the parable of the prodigal son... the parable about that family of a father and his two sons. At the beginning of the story we see that the younger son is the bad boy and the elder son the good boy. But by the end of the story we see that both of them in different ways prove themselves to be obstacles to the family unity and harmony which the father desired more than anything.

The Young and the Restless. The problem begins with the younger son. Without waiting for his father to die, he asks for his share of the inheritance. Then, he abandons his duties and responsibilities in the family estate and goes abroad to live a life of fun. His reckless lifestyle drains his fortunes, and he finds himself reduced to abject poverty and misery. That a Jewish boy like him, obviously tended to most of his life, should condescend to feeding pigs (which Jews regard as unclean animals) shows the depths of degradation in which he finds himself. How did he get to this point? Well, a life of sin quickly enough leads people to a situation where they lose all sense of shame and decency. But, the good news for this young man (and for us) is that no matter how far the sinner strays from the Father's house, the loving heart of the Father always follows him (and us), gently whispering in his heart (and ours), "Come home! Come home!" And so it seems that our wild, fun-loving, globetrotting, profligate spending, pig feeding, sinful younger man has one thing going for him: he is not too proud to go back and say, "I have erred; I am sorry." Like the old Motown chestnut commends: Ain't too proud to beg! And this is precisely what he decides to do.

I Confess. Just imagine how this young man's heart was pounding as he approached his father's house, not knowing whether his father would take him back or not! "But while he was still far off, his father saw him and was filled with compassion; he ran and put his arms around him and kissed him" (Luke 15:20). The young man begins to read his prepared confession — his mea culpa, mea culpa, mea maxima culpa — but

I'll tell you - I don't know. But it's a tradition... Because of our traditions, Everyone knows who he is and what God expects him to do. Tevya, Fiddler on the Roof

My career began in a neighborhood location of a metropolitan area where tradition and the practice of old world customs were important to the families. Or more correctly said, they were important to the parents and grandparents. School aged children practiced the traditions because they were important to their parents and it was the way it always was. During my time there I saw the communities begin to dissipate, young adults were fleeing the neighborhoods and its traditions in favor of suburbia, the quiet tree-lined streets, where every house had a driveway and garage. The concrete pavements in the old neighborhoods were abandoned in favor of green grass and big back yards. And, sadly, abandoned too, oftentimes were the old traditions brought to this country by their parents, or grandparents before them.

One of my favorite stories is told in the movie, Fiddler On The Roof. Oddly enough it was the first movie I ever watched after my husband decided to bring cable television into our home almost thirty years ago. The movie depicts the breakdown of the community and family unit due to circumstances beyond the control of those affected by cruel outside influences. Their traditional practices, and determination to preserve them, however, are packed up with their meager belongings as they set out for a new world.

My maternal family members in part sailed to American shores on a boat set out from England in the very early 1900's. In all honesty, the only real traditions practiced in my family, if any, were of the culinary variety. I suppose that was because of the similarity of the American and English cultures. Speculation, just mere speculation on my part. My grandmother, born in the United States, held fast to her beliefs as an Episcopalian, and although a staunch Democrat, always maintained some allegiance to the concept of rule by a monarch. She and I enjoyed many a tea-party replete with fancy bone-china tea-cups. Lemon slices and a lighted candle were always placed on the table... and some sort of sweet nibble. To this very day my beverage of choice is a good hot cup of tea. A practice passed down by my grandmother, and her grandmother before her.

Lent and Easter are liturgical seasons when a family's traditional practices are often observed. Many of these customs have been preserved from the "old country" and will serve to enrich the ritual practices associated with the seasons.

Permit me please to once again to summon up memories of my dear grandmother. She had a particular fondness for hotcross buns. If it was Easter, by george, there were going to be hot-cross buns in the house. Most times they were ordered days ahead of time from the local bakery, but there were those special times when she and I prepared the recipe ourselves. Home-baked and enjoyed with melted butter and marmalade. Add a cup of hot tea, and there you have yourself a tradition! Simply stated, a hot cross bun is a spiced sweet bun usually made with dried fruit, raisins, or currents, marked with a simple white cross on the top. They have been traditionally eaten on Good Friday. The traditional recipe has its roots in the United Kingdom, and my grandmother learned to bake them from her mother.

And so, it wasn't too very long ago that I began thinking about those days in the kitchen with my grandmother. I toyed with thoughts of baking hot cross buns over our Easter holiday break, and I might. The modern bakery version just will not compare, if I could even find them.

I learned a great deal about cooking while working alongside my grandmother in the kitchen. There's a lot to learn. Measuring skills, appreciating the concept and meaning of a fraction, reading a recipe properly, safety with cooking tools, not to mention the opportunity to create lifelong memories.

I have a few websites you might reference for hot cross bun recipes and directions. Know ahead of time; it will probably take the better part of an afternoon, but the end results are well worth the time investment. And it's a sweet (literally) tradition to start with the family.

So how about donning the apron, pulling down the canister of flour, a great big mixing bowl and get started on the recipe, just you and the kiddos? And, do not forget to fill the kettle!!

Tevya, Fiddler on the Roof his father is so overjoyed he does not even appear to be intently listening to it (but he is listening, of course).

Good News, Except for the Calf. Then the father, with his overjoy in overdrive, says to his servants, "*Quickly, bring out a robe -- the best one -- and put it on him; put a ring on his finger and sandals on his feet. And get the fatted calf and kill it, and let us eat and celebrate; for this son of mine was dead and is alive again; he was lost and is found!*" (Luke 15:22-24). And they began to celebrate the good news of the younger son's return to the fold. Or to put it in the words of Kool and the Gang from their 1980 hit songs: "Celebrate good times, come on!"

Old Brother: "Huh?" At this point the story shows us the flaws of the good elder brother. Instead of rejoicing that his brother who was presumed lost (or even dead) has come back, he is angered by the fact that their father has received him back with a celebration. In anger he distances himself from his own family and from the party. As he leaves he is likely muttering to himself, "This is unfair. This is unfair" -- a word that is often used to justify anger, intolerance, self-righteousness and violence. In so doing, the "good" elder brother brings disunity to the father's house and sorrow to himself. The sins of those who are not good enough (younger brother) as well as the sins of those who are too good (elder brother) are equally obstacles in the realization of unity and harmony in the father's house.

The Heart of the Matter. We are all sinners. Whether your sins are more visible like those of the younger son or more hidden like those of the elder son, the message for us today is that we all need to repent and return to the father's house. The younger son needs to turn back from his frivolous lifestyle and return to the father's house and be a responsible and obedient son. The elder son needs to turn back from anger and resentment and learn to share the house with the apparently undeserving younger brother. Or to quote from the 1980s hit song, "The Heart of the Matter," "*There are people in your life who've come and gone / y'know they let you down / you know they hurt your pride. / You better put it all behind you / cause life goes on / [and] if you keep carrying that anger / it'll eat you up inside."* I would imagine the song was missing from the old brother's Apple Music playlist!

Yet Another Story. After pondering the parable of the Prodigal Son, I am reminded of a churchy anecdote I heard years ago. This anecdote would seem to be a good jumping off point for this reflection (lest I use my words far to prodigally). The story, as it is told, goes like this: One weekend, a Sunday school teacher was teaching her young students about the parable of the Prodigal Son. After teaching her students about that Parable, and reading the entire bible passage to them, the teacher asked the children this question: "Now tell me: Who do think suffered the most in the story?" One little child raised her hand and answered, "The fatted calf." Very true, very funny and very much puts me in the mood for a burger!

No Feast for You! That humorous anecdote aside, I would assert that next to the aforementioned fatted calf, on the list of those who suffered the most in that parable, comes the elder son. Yes, I would say that the one who suffered the most was the elder son who remained outside while the party went on inside. He did not even get to taste the fatted calf that he had helped to raise. He did not get to enjoy the feast. He did not get to share in another's joy and success. He did not get to find joy in his brother's return. The older brother was walking around angry because his Father was forgiving: His brother sought (and received) forgiveness, and the older brother begrudged his younger brother — to his own detriment.

That older brother suffered because he stuck to his own ideas of fairness and justice and failed to see that the Father's ways are not our ways. He failed to recall the words of Isaiah 55:8-9, *"For my thoughts are not your thoughts, nor are your ways my ways... for as the heavens are higher than the earth, so are my ways higher than your ways, my thoughts higher than your thoughts."* And let us thank the Lord for that!
