

RECEIVING THE SACRAMENTS

The seven Sacraments of the Church were instituted by Christ to confer grace.

Sacrament of Baptism. Call the office to register for Parent Pre-Baptismal Instruction. For adults seeking to enter the Church and be Baptized, contact our Religious Education Office.

Sacrament of Reconciliation (Confession).

Children in our religious education program and school are prepared for Confession at age seven as part of First Communion preparation.

Sacrament of the Holy Eucharist. Children in our religious education program and school are prepared for First Communion at age seven. Adults seeking First Communion should contact our Religious Education Office. To request a visitation for Holy Communion to the Sick, contact our parish office.

Sacrament of Confirmation. Young people in our parish are prepared for reception of Confirmation in the ninth grade (age 14). Adults seeking Confirmation should contact our Religious Education Office.

Sacrament of Marriage. Couples planning for Marriage are to contact a parish priest or deacon one year in advance to set the wedding date and plan for pre-Cana instruction.


Sacrament of Holy Orders. If you believe you have, or someone you know has, a vocation to the Priesthood or Diaconate, please contact one of our parish priests.

Anointing of the Sick. For the Sacrament of Anointing of the Sick, which is administered by a Priest, a person or an immediate family member must make the request. Late night requests may not be able to be answered until the next day.

LENT

The rules for fasting an abstinence for Lent are as follows:

- · Every person 14 years of age or older must abstain from meat (and items made with meat) on Ash Wednesday, Good Friday, and all the Fridays of Lent.
- · Every person between the age of 18 and 60 must fast on Ash Wednesday and Good Friday.
- · Every person 14 years of age or older must abstain from meat (and items made with meat) on all other Fridays of the year, unless he or she substitutes some other form of penance for abstinence.

Dear Parishioners,

There is an island off the coast of Scotland – well off the coast of Scotland – beyond the Outer Hebrides; it is called Flannan Island (or collectively, with neighboring islands, Flannan Isles). As tradition tells us, this was an uninhabited island that a Bishop, St. Flannan, went to in the seventh century in anticipation perhaps of establishing a Christian community. It was there that he built a church. The remains of that Church are still there today on that island.

A Lightbulb Goes On! The island itself, later given the name Flannan Island, never did develop a Christian community, or any population to speak of. Fast forward to 1899, and it was decided that due to the rocky coastal area and the increase of ships in the area, a lighthouse should be erected. And so, it was, in late 1899, the Flannan Island lighthouse beacon blazed for the first time.

Missing. In 1900, with the light house operational, it became manned by three men: James Ducat, Thomas Marshall, and Donald McArthur (with another employee spending time on shore). On December 15, 1900, a passing ship noticed the lighthouse was not functioning, and it reported the circumstance. A relief vessel was soon sent and arrived the day after Christmas to check on things. As the crew of the relief vessel, *The Hesperus*, approached the island, they noted the flag was not flying as it normally would, nor did any of the staff of the lighthouse come out to greet them.

Weather or not. When they landed and went to the light house, they found no one. They examined the lighthouse and found none of the lighthouse keepers. They found their beds unmade and their clocks unwound. One report said that an uneaten meal was sitting out on the table in the kitchen area. Some reports asserted that log entries indicated high winds and storms around the island; but the area weather reports indicated the opposite. As one report of the incident stated: "Everything was in order. The lamp was ready to be lit and it was evident that the work of the forenoon of the 15th had been completed. This indicated the men had disappeared on the afternoon of Saturday, December 15."

What Happened? So, what happened to the men at the Flannan Isle lighthouse remains a mystery. The most common theory is that a large wave or waves may have engulfed the island, and the men, outside — securing the property or helping an endangered coworker — were washed away. Damage to some of the iron railings, as well as turf damage on a cliff 200

feet high, could indicate that scenario. Other theories, some fanciful, arose also: that the island was attacked by a sea monster; that the men abandoned the island set off to start new lives elsewhere; that one of the men killed the other two and then fled; or that a ghostly presence on the island led them to their deaths.

Of Genesis and Mysteries. In any event, no one knows what happened at the Flannan Island lighthouse. The truth remains shrouded in mystery. We don't know how, when, why, or who caused this circumstance. And for this reason, the mystery of the Flannan Island lighthouse continues to be pondered, reconsidered, and speculated about today – it remains one of the great mysteries in Scottish maritime history. The rock group Genesis even wrote a song about it called "The Mystery of Flannan Isle Lighthouse", while the 2018 film "The Vanishing" is loosely based on this story.

A Mystery Not to be Solved. The question that this story leaves us is: What happened. And the answer is: We don't know, it is a mystery. We may never know how those men were lost. But, as we approach the final period of Lent, we as a Christian people ponder and consider the Paschal Mystery - and consider how we could have been lost, but by Christ's great Passion, were saved. The Paschal Mystery is how Christ's Passion, Death, and Resurrection saved us from sin and death for new life as sons and daughters of God. And there is the sense, by the use of the word "mystery" - that like the Flannan Island lighthouse mystery – there is something for us to solve here. In fact, however, the Pascal Mystery, is not that type of a mystery at all - no - it is a mystery to be pondered, not solved. And in truth, the use of the word "mystery" is a bit of a mislead, at least in terms of the way we use that word, today.

Mystery and Sacrament. You see, the word "mystery" in its more ancient use comes from the Greek word "mysterion" which is also the word that the Greeks used for our word "sacrament." The idea of a "mysterion" (or "sacramentum" in Latin) by the third century had taken on the meaning of something that is to be kept sacred. Thus, the Paschal Mystery which is bound up in Christ's Passion, Death, and Resurrection, are part of the most sacred days of our

The Patriot's Pen essay contest is held annually and sponsored by the local chapters of Veterans of Foreign War. Mrs. Toya Peek challenges her students and provides instructional guidance for them as they write essays addressing the theme for the year. No more than 400 words, the essay must be the contestant's original work and a product of the contestant's own thinking. The approach to the Patriot's Pen theme should be positive and clearly focused. The theme for the 2022-2023 school year was "My Pledge to Our Veterans."

We are very proud of seventh grade student Samuel Shevock for the national recognition received for the essay written in response to the theme. Recognized for the excellence and sincerity of his writing, Samuel placed 24th in the nation. Mr. Larry Josefowski from the local chapter, Camden VFW Post 3238, retired VFW members Mr. William Hall and Ms. Leona Hill were on hand to present Samuel with a certificate of achievement and monetary award.

Samuel's essay follows:

My Pledge to Our Veterans

There are countless ways to honor the bravery and selflessness of our veterans. From Memorial Day parades to prayer services, we can show our thanks in many different ways. One important, but less obvious, way to honor our veterans is reduce the number of stresses in their lives. I pledge to always support our veterans by supporting causes that help veterans' financial well-being. I can support veterans' financial well-being by advocating for free behavioral health services, supporting scholarship programs for veterans, and donating money to organizations that help homeless veterans.

One important way I can support veterans' financial well-being is by advocating for free behavioral health services. Veterans have higher rates of depression, anxiety, post-traumatic stress disorder (PTSD) and traumatic brain injury (TBI) compared to non-veterans. Health systems designed to serve veterans do not always have behavioral health resources available. Many veterans may not get the help they need because they cannot afford behavioral health services including individual therapy, group therapy, and service animals.

A second way I can support veterans' financial well-being is by supporting scholarship programs that make it more likely for veterans to attend college or trade school. Many veterans joined the military straight out of high school. If a veteran has to leave the military due to injury or illness, they may not have the skills they need to help them find a new career. Supporting programs designed to help veterans pay for college and trade school is an important way to make sure veterans can reinvent a new life outside of the military.

Finally, I can support veterans' financial well-being by donating money to organizations that help homeless veterans. Military veterans make up 11% of the homeless population in the U.S. According to the VA, 37,252 veterans experienced homelessness in January 2020. This is not right for the brave men and women who served our country courageously.

In conclusion, veterans have sacrificed so much on our behalf. As thanks, I pledge to, and we all should do our best to make sure that veterans do not have any unnecessary financial burdens to worry about. Supporting veterans' financial well-being also has benefits for their family members. When our veterans are financially stable, they have more resources to devote to living healthy, successful lives after their time in the military.

church year: **Holy Week**. A week when we pause, with great intention, to ponder the events of these Holy Days in the life of our Savior.

The Week Called Holy. In the pondering of the event of Holy Week, especially of the Passion of Christ, we know the who, what, where, when of this situation. It is expressed in the Scriptures, it has been elaborated on in books, movies, music, and television. We are also called to see our role in the events that transpire, to see and repent from our role in Christ's suffering. In other words, it requires us not just to look at this as a story made up of external events, but to recognize our role in the story, and our vested interest, our salvific hope, in its outcome. The Paschal Mystery is one that takes us from death to new life, but only within the context of the Passion of Christ, the one, only and singular savior and redeemer of mankind.

With that in mind, keeping the Paschal Mystery in our hearts and mind, pondering, praying, and repenting, let us look at that sacred time we call Holy Week, that we might never take Christ's Passion – his love for us borne out in his suffering for us – for granted.

Monday of Holy Week. Following Palm Sunday, Jesus goes to his Father's house, the Great Temple of Jerusalem. There he sees charlatan moneychangers (to whom people gave coins and gold in exchange for animals to be sacrificed in the Temple), swindling folks. In righteous indignation, he upended their tables, whipped them, and kicked them out (Matthew 21:12-13). He cleansed the Temple. Needless to say, Jesus'actions in the temple did not go over well with the powers that be.

Prayer for Monday of Holy Week: Grant, we pray, almighty God, that, though in our weakness we fail, we may be revived through the Passion of your Only Begotten Son. Who lives and reigns with you in the unity of the Holy Spirit, God, for ever and ever. Amen.

Tuesday of Holy Week. The incident in the Temple, as mentioned, did not sit well with everyone, and so to trip him up, his detractors asked him this question: "Is it lawful for us to pay tribute to Caesar or not?" (Luke 20:22). Christ answers famously that one should render "to Caesar what belongs to Caesar and to God what belongs to God" (Luke 20:25). Their attempt to pit Jesus against either the faithful or the Roman government failed. The authorities were taken aback by his answer "and leaving him they went away" (Matthew 22:22). Jesus on this same day is challenged by the Sadducees about resurrection; his clear response silenced them. At this point, "When the Pharisees heard that he had silenced the Sadducees, they gathered together." (Matthew 22:34).

Prayer for Tuesday of Holy Week: Almighty ever-living God, grant us so to celebrate the mysteries of the Lord's Passion that we may merit to receive your pardon. Through our Lord Jesus Christ, your Son, who lives and reigns with you in the unity of the Holy Spirit, God, for ever and ever. Amen.

Spy Wednesday. On Wednesday, the plotting against Jesus went into motion: The Chief Priests knew they needed to arrest Jesus when there would be few of his supporters around; to do this they needed a spy from Jesus' inner-circle. They focused on Christ's Apostle, Judas, who seemed the most pliable. John 13:2 tells us that the Devil "induced Judas... to hand [Jesus] over." The Chief Priests "paid [Judas] thirty pieces of silver" (Matthew 26:15), and that was an offer he could not refuse. He agreed to help them, knowing he was imperiling Jesus. From these events, this day is commonly referred to as "Spy Wednesday." Judas then waited for "an opportunity to hand him over." (Matthew 26:16).

Prayer for Wednesday of Holy Week: O God, who willed your Son to submit for our sake to the yoke of the Cross, so that you might drive from us the power of the enemy, grant us, your servants, to attain the grace of the resurrection. Through our Lord Jesus Christ, your Son, who lives and reigns with you in the unity of the Holy Spirit, God, for ever and ever. Amen.
