RECEIVING THE SACRAMENTS

The seven Sacraments of the Church were instituted by Christ to confer grace.

Sacrament of Baptism. Call the office to register for Parent Pre-Baptismal Instruction. For adults seeking to enter the Church and be Baptized, contact our Religious Education Office.

Sacrament of Reconciliation (Confession).

Children in our religious education program and school are prepared for Confession at age seven as part of First Communion preparation.

Sacrament of the Holy Eucharist. Children in our religious education program and school are prepared for First Communion at age seven. Adults seeking First Communion should contact our Religious Education Office. To request a visitation for Holy Communion to the Sick, contact our parish office.

Sacrament of Confirmation. Young people in our parish are prepared for reception of Confirmation in the ninth grade (age 14). Adults seeking Confirmation should contact our Religious Education Office.

Sacrament of Marriage. Couples planning for Marriage are to contact a parish priest or deacon one year in advance to set the wedding date and plan for pre-Cana instruction.

Sacrament of Holy Orders. If you believe you have, or someone you know has, a vocation to the Priesthood or Diaconate, please contact one of our parish priests.

Anointing of the Sick. For the Sacrament of Anointing of the Sick, which is administered by a Priest, a person or an immediate family member must make the request. Late night requests may not be able to be answered until the next day.

Dear Parishioners,

Back in Brooklyn, around the corner from my family's house, was a bustling main street called 18th Avenue (now called Christopher Columbus Blvd.). Eighteenth Avenue was where you went get anything you needed. There were "salumerias" (delicatessans), "trattorias" (small restaurants that also serve wine), "pescherias" (fish/seafood stores), butcher shops, cafes, pasta stores, clothing stores, a movie theatre, a supermarket... all in walking distance.

Social Network - Retro. One interesting place on 18th Avenue, just around the corner from us, was a store front that bore the name "The Santa Rosalia Society." It was what they used to call a men's social club; this is where the men in the neighborhood, mostly older, would kibitz, smoke cigars, play cards, and other activities (it's also where you want to "play the numbers," etc.). In the front window of that store front was a statue of saint — St. Rosalia. Her image was tall, standing, eyes looking heavenwards, hands in prayer, and surrounded by mountainous or perhaps desert like trappings (on the ground near her was a skull, there was sand, some rocks, but also some roses).

Who's that Girl? But I wondered, who the heck is Santa Rosalia? I knew St. Francis, St. Dominic, St. Anthony, St. Joseph, St. Peter, St. Catherine, St. Mary, St. Maria Goretti — but I never heard of Santa Rosalia. I remember asking my dad about the name of the social club; he said there are lots of saints we don't know about but that she was probably some Italian saint from way back. I walked by that social club regularly for years, but in that preinternet era, I settled for my dad's answer, she's an Italian saint from way back.

Of Saints and Parmesan Cheese. Years later, I was reading a book of hagiographies (saint biographies) and lo and behold, there was an entry for Santa Rosalia. Immediately my mind shot back to 18th Avenue and the Santa Rosalia Society. And I decided it was time to end the mystery of Santa Rosalia and find out about her. My eyes were glued to her story like parmesan cheese melted on a veal cutlet.

The Writing is on the Wall. So, here's the story: St. Rosalia was a Sicilian saint. She was raised in a royal family in Sicily, but rejected the trappings of royalty and wealth. So she moved away from her family, and adopted the life of a hermit, living in a cave (to which the angels had led her) on Mount Pellegrino near the city of Palermo, Sicily. In the cave, she wrote a message on the wall, "I, Rosalia, daughter of Sinibald, Lord of Roses, and Quisquina, have taken the resolution to live in this cave for the love of my Lord, Jesus Christ." This reminded her of where she came from, where she was, and why

she was there. As the story goes, St. Rosalia lived a hermit-like life of prayer and penance, in and around her cave. She remained separated from the world until the end of her life. It is said she died alone buried in a cave in, at the age of 30 in 1160.

Cave, Man. In 1625, a local resident from Palermo stumbled upon St. Rosalia's cave. He dug down into it, and found her relics (remains) and her message on the cave wall. People in Sicily knew about history of St. Rosalia, but this finding spiritually electrified the nation. Sicily at the time was suffering from a period of terrible plague, with many people sick and dying. The man who found the relic announced his find, and the relics were taken as a sign of God's favor, and they were paraded through the streets of Palermo, Sicily, with people gathering in prayer. Three days later the plague abated, and St. Rosalia's intercession deemed the cause of the cure. Ultimately her feast day became a grand national day of celebration in Sicily and throughout portions of Italy. In 1927, the Pope (Pius XI) declared her feast day (September 4) to be a Holy Day of Obligation throughout Italy (though that is no longer the case)

Go Tell It on the Mountainside. Over the years, I've seen artwork of this little known saint of great importance, and it seems that the Santa Rosalia Society in Brooklyn in their window display of Santa Rosalia knew a lot about how she was depicted in Church art over the years: shown, usually, with a skull; sometimes holding a cross or Bible; hands in prayer; shown on a mountainside, etc. While that Santa Rosalia social club is now long gone, the memory of that image of Santa Rosalia has remained with me over the years. And I would guess that is how devotion or histories of the lives of the saints spread over the years: from images, from memories, and from stories repeated or written down. So, I guess, right here, in this column, I am continuing to spread the facts about the life a great saintly woman, and making her known to another generation of Catholics.

Questions. Of course, there are always questions, like, "If Santa Rosalia went off to the mountain and saw no one throughout her life, how do we know angels led her there? How do we know about her holding a cross and a Bible? How do we even know she died, let alone in what year." It reminded me in a horror movie once where one

- ¿Porque Mayo es el mes de María? Durante siglos la Iglesia Católica ha dedicado todo el mes de mayo para honrar a la Virgen María, la Madre de Dios. La idea de un mes dedicado específicamente a María se remonta al tiempo barroco o siglo XVII. Si bien, no siempre se llevó a cabo en mayo, el mes de María incluía treinta ejercicios espirituales diarios en honor a la Madre de Dios. Fue en esta época que el mes de mayo y de María se combinaron, haciendo que esta celebración cuente con devociones especiales organizadas cada día durante todo el mes. Esta costumbre se extendió sobre todo durante el siglo XIX y se practica hasta hoy. Es común que las parroquias tengan en mayo un rezo diario del Rosario y muchas erijan un altar especial con una estatua o imagen de María. Además, se trata de una larga tradición el coronar su estatua, una costumbre conocida como la Coronación de Mayo.

Esta coronación es en algunas áreas una gran celebración y, por lo general, se lleva a cabo fuera de la Misa. Los altares y coronaciones en este mes no son solo privilegios de la parroquia. En los hogares también se puede participar plenamente en la vida de la Iglesia.

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The Knights of Columbus is the world's largest Catholic family fraternal service organization with 1.7 million members. It provides members and their families with volunteer opportunities in service to the Catholic Church, their communities, families and young people. Founded in the United States in 1882, it is named in honor of Christopher Columbus and dedicated to the principles of Charity, Unity, Fraternity, and Patriotism. If you have the chance to research their rich history you might be surprised by the influence they have had throughout American history. I was most surprised to learn that the words, "under God" in our Pledge of Allegiance were added as a result of the influence and strong efforts of the Knights of Columbus.

In the not-too-distant past I was approached by Dr. Wayne Thomas, a member of the Holy Cross Chapter of the Knights of Columbus. He was inquiring into the feasibility of a monetary donation to the Scholarship Fund of HCS. The proposal entailed the donation of proceeds from one of the Friday Fish Fry events. In our conversation I raised the possibility presenting the Living Stations as a token of appreciation. Our eighth-grade students as leaders and representatives of the student body would have had the opportunities for a few "dress rehearsals" as they would have presented before the students. I was confident of their ability and willingness to prepare for an evening presentation for the parishioners. He agreed to present my proposal to his fellow Knights at an upcoming meeting. character tells another about the story of a haunted house, and then says that no one who learns about the secrets of this house lives to tell the tale. My question: Then how does anyone know the house has secrets, and how does the tale get known? But there I go, over-thinking things a little too much, rather than using the example of our Blessed Mother Mary and just pondering.

Answers. However, not to leave you with the seeds of doubt, let me answer my questions about Santa Rosalia which help explain how we got to know about her. The truth about Santa Rosalia and other hermits of her era was this: Though hermits lived lives of seclusion, they still lived in the context of the world, and indeed as specific and unique part of society. People, back in the day, would visit hermits, who were deemed by their way of life to be extremely holy people because they spent so much time alone, in prayer, pondering the wonders of God. Hermits would be sought out for their wisdom and spiritual insight. Thus, while Santa Rosalia, lived the life of a hermit, she still encountered people; people likely brought her food and tended to some of her basic needs; and people knew exactly where she was living her hermit like life.

Who's Zooming Who? How does Santa Rosalia's story apply to us? Well, in the world we live in today presents to us the ironic situation in which we are a society of people who are more inter-connected than ever before (by phone, email, text, social media, etc.) and yet isolation and loneliness pervades the lives of many. How can that be? Much of it has to do with the lack of human contact and interaction; we have yet to come to the realization that "cyber" connections are not human connections — or as I like to say, in a "Zoom meeting" no one is actually meeting, because if I can't shake your hand, pass you a glass or water, or borrow a pen from you, etc., then we are not meeting at all: We are watching each other on a computer screen.

Empty. This cyber-existence has left us empty — whether it be Zoom, text, Twitter, Facebook, etc. — because, simply put, it does not replace human contact. Even Santa Rosalia, who lived a hermit-like life, still had human contact. As scripture tells us: It is not good to for man to be alone. And yet, technology has, oddly, left us very connected, but very alone and isolated. According to a study back in 2019, some 52% of respondents sometimes or always felt lonely or isolated. This plague of loneliness, no doubt, has a lot to do with the anti-social behavior that we see in our world today. People learn to be social by being social — by being connected; and this assuages loneliness.

Living on a Prayer. But the other takeaway from the Santa Rosalia story is that though she lived a hermit-like life, she was very connected to God, living a life of prayer and reflection. She didn't feel alone because God was always in her life, day to day, moment to moment. One of the societal problems that causes folks to feel isolated and alone is that absence of God in society. Prior to the mid-20th century, religion played a major role in daily life and indeed in the comings and goings of society. While people had different beliefs — in the sense of religious differentiation — the people collectively saw the importance of God in our lives, in our towns, in our counties, in our nations and in our world. Today, God is being stripped out of more and more areas of public life; the existence of God for society today is no longer a given. This circumstance abets the problems of loneliness and isolation.

Alone Again, Naturally? Thus many people today who feel isolated, tend to experience the ultimate isolation: not just isolated by technology's intervention in daily life (i.e., less interaction with human beings), but more so by the lack of the presence of God in the structures of our modern culture, society and in the lives of many. Christ was fully man and fully God, those isolated today often lack the presence of both man and God in their lives. That needs to change; and it needs to change on both the personal and on the societal level.

Santa Rosalia was a famous hermit; she lived on the fringes of society — off alone much of the time. But she did interact and spend time with people. And when she was alone she spent time with God. A good person is never alone, and the story of Santa Rosalia tells us that as clear as can be. St. Rosalia pray for us!
