

RECEIVING THE SACRAMENTS

The seven Sacraments of the Church were instituted by Christ to confer grace.

Sacrament of Baptism. Call the office to register for Parent Pre-Baptismal Instruction. For adults seeking to enter the Church and be Baptized, contact our Religious Education Office.

Sacrament of Reconciliation (Confession). Children in our religious education program and school are prepared for Confession at age seven as part of First Communion preparation.

Sacrament of the Holy Eucharist. Children in our religious education program and school are prepared for First Communion at age seven. Adults seeking First Communion should contact our Religious Education Office. To request a visitation for Holy Communion to the Sick, contact our parish office.

Sacrament of Confirmation. Young people in our

parish are prepared for reception of Confirmation in the ninth grade (age 14). Adults seeking Confirmation should contact our Religious Education Office.

Sacrament of Marriage. Couples planning for Marriage are to contact a parish priest or deacon one year in advance to set the wedding date and plan for pre-Cana instruction.

Sacrament of Holy Orders. If you believe you have, or someone you know has, a vocation to the Priesthood or Diaconate, please contact one of our parish priests.

Anointing of the Sick. For the Sacrament of Anointing of the Sick, which is administered by a Priest, a person or an immediate family member must make the request. Late night requests may not be able to be answered until the next day.

Our Mass Book is no open to receive names for intentions.

Due to the reduced number of Masses we are currently offering, we must restrict the number of requests. Please see below:

- 1. You can request ONLY 3 Masses per family and payment of \$10 per Mass is required at the time of the request.
- 2. Requests MUST written out providing your name, phone number, email, maximum three requests listing date and time of request (with alternative dates) and with person's name (remember intention can be for one person or members of same family only for the intentions). We will do our best to honor your request. Please note the Mass times: 8 am Masses Monday through Saturday (8:15 on Wednesdays), 5 pm Saturday Mass, Sunday 7:30 am, 9:30 am and 11:30 am Spanish Masses.
- 3. Requests will be taken Monday through Fridays, 8:30 am to 2 pm only.
- 4. Requests for the Church tabernacle candle or Adoration Chapel candle can also be made. \$10 per request. Limit one request per person.

An Announcement for Parishes in the Silver Lake Deanery

Dear Parishioners of Holy Cross and Immaculate Conception Parishes:

The Silver Lake Deanery is Church's administrative territory covering the areas overseen by St. Dennis (Galena), St. Polycarp (Smyrna), Holy Cross (Dover), Immaculate Conception (Marydel), and St. John the Apostle (Milford/Harrington). As part of the Diocesan Planning process, the various Deaneries of the Diocese of Wilmington, are seeking ways in which Parishes within a Deanery can more effectively work together to provide services to the faithful (and, conversely, identifying those areas where that is not practical).

Brief Survey. To that end, as Dean of the Silver Lake Deanery, I have compiled a survey to get parishioner assessment regarding areas/topics that have been reviewed by our Deanery Committee or by the Diocesan Pastoral Planning process. The survey is fairly simple, and should take only a few minutes to complete.

Deadline. I would like to compile the results of this survey to present to our Bishop and the steering committee of this Pastoral Planning process by early December. Thus, I would set the deadline for submissions to this survey as Tuesday, **November 28**, **2023.**

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Dear Parishioners,

With Thanksgiving lurking a few weeks away, I want to write about giving thanks. So often, in a world we are consumed with the 24-hour news cycle giving of angst and agita, coronavirus giving us concern, and the battle of everyday life feeling occasionally insurmountable, we need to hit pause, we need to chill out, and we need to take a deep breath and see things with the eyes of faith and not the eyes of fear. In short, while realizing the troubles of life, we have to focus on the blessings of life and be thankful to God for those blessings, past, present

and future.

This Answers the Question "Y". And it needs to be sincere gratitude. Which reminds me of terrible joke I've been saving up for a homily, but I'll use it here instead: A man goes to get a loan. And he presents himself well. The loan officer, Mr. Jackson, is impressed by how professional he is, and says, "Wow! You have an amazing work history and you present yourself fantastically but you seem to be missing five years of your life on the job history part of your application, why is that?" The man, "Oh, yes, that was the five year period where I didn't work because I went to Yale" says the man. The loan officer says, "I went to Yale, too." He pointed to his diploma on the wall. The man says, "Yes, I noticed." The officer says, "Yes, I think we can help a Yale man." A half hour later, the loan officer hands the man a bank check for \$25,000 — his loan. The man took the check got up and began to leave. He showed his gratitude by saying "And thanks for the money. I appreciate it. And I appreciated my time in Yale wasn't held against me!" And as he made his way out the door he smirked and said, "Thank you for everything... time to get back to my yob, Mr. Yackson."

Unlimited Thanks. Okay, that's an awful yoke, I mean joke. But the guy in that story wasn't really truly thankful, he was happy that he pulled one over on someone else... and got what he wanted. But thanks cannot be limited to being given only when we get what we what we want. So, how should we understand true gratitude and thankfulness? Good question.

Good God! Bishop Fulton Sheen used to say there that are two kinds of people in our world: Those who wake up and say, "Good morning, God!" and those who say, "Good God, morning." The distinction between these two folks is that one sees God and wants to give thanks for the new day to one who gave him the new day. The other guy – and isn't this like us some of the time - says "ugh, not another day for me to get through." That second person isn't thankful, he is thank-impaired as the politically-correct language folks might want to phrase it. And yet, regardless of our outlook, here comes Thanksgiving! Here comes that day when as a nation, we need to give thanks to God, with a full heart. But, sometimes when life is tough, thanks don't come easy.

Missal Command. When I have those moments where thanks are not easy to come by and gratitude comes at a premium, I think about the words of Christ we hear in The Roman Missal (or

Occasionally my husband and I will drive down to the beach area of the state. Regardless of the season, the traffic is always something to be reckoned with. Regardless of the season everyone is always in a hurry making for hazardous driving conditions. I am always more comfortable on the back roads, and I travel back roads whenever feasible to eliminate the harum-scarum.

It is immaterial where the highways or the roads less traveled might take you, the sprawl of the new construction of housing developments is everywhere. Some may see this in a positive light. I, on the other hand have grave concerns for the wildlife that inhabit the forest areas. It's the forested areas that fall victim to that which is otherwise known as growth and progress in the housing market.

It is one of the semi-back roads that I travel every Sunday morning on my way to Mass. It's not a highway, but is a road frequently traveled where many wooded areas can be found. Over the years new homes have surfaced while leaving some of the smaller wooded areas untouched. Last week during my drive, I noticed with some disdain an area that had recently been intruded upon by massive earth movers and chain saws leaving tree stumps of various sizes, some taller than others in their wake. Clearly, the whole scenario promised a return of the invaders possessing the single intention of clearing the land. But there was one tiny sprig of a tree left standing close to the edge of the road. It was a pitiable looking sight making Charlie Brown's Christmas tree look like a plush evergreen. One lone regarding soldier on the field left standing.

We are in the time of year where new family meetings are cropping up on my calendar. I listen to many stories when I ask the simple question; "what brings you to Holy Cross?" Some of the families are new to the area and are seeking a continuation of their previous Catholic school education. Others have inquired because of the good word shared by colleagues. Others are fleeing the alternative school setting offered in the immediate or surrounding geographic areas. Most offer their primary reason is for the safer environment provided by a smaller school setting. Many parents speak of their own Catholic school education and the desire to provide that same positive learning experience for their children.

Despite the factors influencing the effectiveness of schools in other areas, Holy Cross has remained a strong educational choice for thousands for going on seventy years. Standing alone, Holy Cross pulls from areas as far south as Lewes, and Lincoln. Mr. Sam, our bus driver for the south bus stops every morning to board a pretty fair number of students in Milford as he makes his daily trek north. A couple more are sprinkled along the way before his morning arrival. Our students also travel by bus or car from the outer reaches of Clayton, traveling south there are many families who call Smyrna home and have sought out Holy Cross as the school choice for their children.

I think about those heavily wooded areas, forest lands that used to be. Trees standing tall, they were a constant on the landscape, a safe-haven, a home to the fauna indigenous to the area. I think about the manner in which the quality of their beauty has been sacrificed and I compare that to the school systems that once were. It can be said that in the history of education the non-private sector offered an educational experience that adequately prepared the student for making decisions regarding options for their future. Many years ago, those who chose a Catholic school based their decision on their faith and were desirous of the religious instruction provided in the curriculum. I attended a public school for twelve years. I attended a Catholic college when the choice was mine to make. My friend in the neighborhood attended a local Catholic school for twelve years. I remember we would do our homework together every night. Yes, I had homework every night. I remember her consumable workbooks, so different from my hardcover textbooks. I remember her uniform.

Notwithstanding the daily Religion classes, I don't believe my twelve years of public school education was any less adequate than her twelve years of Catholic education. We were both able and ready to transition into college successfully, and we did. We both graduated and entered our respective professional career fields. Over time, the educational landscape in America has changed. Both educational entities, public and private were once acceptable and trusted options for families.

Like the diminishing global landscape no longer able to provide a sheltered home and food source for wildlife, the alternative to Catholic education is failing it's students. But I feel confident in the future. When all others falter and fail, Catholic education will remain the plush evergreen in the fallow field of education.

as some altar servers call it, "the big red book at Mass"). In the Missal, in the celebration of the Eucharist (which itself means 'thanksgiving'), during the Eucharistic Prayer, we hear about Jesus Christ giving thanks at the most difficult moments imaginable.

In the First Eucharistic Prayer (The Roman Canon) we hear these words: "On the day before he was to suffer he took bread in his holy and venerable hands, and with eyes raised to heaven to you, O God, his almighty Father, giving you thanks he said the blessing, broke the bread and gave it to his disciples..."

In the Second Eucharistic Prayer we hear: "At the time he was betrayed and entered willingly into his Passion, he took bread and, giving thanks, broke it, and gave it to his disciples..."

In the Third Eucharistic Prayer we hear: "For on the night he was betrayed he himself took bread, and giving you thanks he said the blessing, broke the bread and gave it to his disciples..."

In the Fourth Eucharist Prayer, written in poetic tones by St. Bede, we hear: "For when the hour had come for him to be glorified by you, Father most holy, having loved his own who were in the world, he loved them to the end... he gave thanks, and gave the chalice to his disciples..."

Thankful Cheers. Imagine, knowing you are about to be put to death – an ignominious death, at that – and the first thing you think to do is give thanks to God. Nonetheless, that is what we are called to do. We are to give thanks for God's light in what oft seems a world of darkness. That might be tough to do at times, but that is our faith! As Carla Tortelli on the TV show "Cheers" once said about our Catholic faith, "It's not a religion for wusses." It challenges us. We are to be a people of thankfulness, hope, and joy.

Howdy Pilgrim. Think about the Pilgrims at the first Thanksgiving in 1621: There were no Catholics present there. Who was there? Pilgrims were there; they made a tough journey from Europe, to a new, unknown land. Along with the pilgrim were some American Indians, natives to the land. Those two groups, from different worlds, so to speak, gathered for three days and thanked God for an abundant harvest. Mind you this came after an horrendous first year, in which many Pilgrims died. And yet as Christians, they remembered their losses, they bore their crosses, but then paused to give thanks to God for their lives, for their family, for the food before them, and for their fellow men who they found in the Indian tribes of New England. We, too, are challenged to have that same faith: Yes, it is easy to give thanks when things are going our way. But, we need to be able to be thankful, to see God's blessings, even when things are going sideways.

Of Grace and Wounds. Remember that Gospel story about the ten lepers? They came to Christ who healed them all. Then scripture tells us:

And one of [the ten lepers], realizing he had been healed, returned, glorifying God in a loud voice; and he fell at the feet of Jesus and thanked him. He was a Samaritan. Jesus said in reply, "Ten were cleansed, were they not? Where are the other nine? Has none but this foreigner returned to give thanks to God?" Then he said to him, "Stand up and go; your faith has saved you.

Only one came back to say thank you. Why? Good question! I recently read a reflection by a priest who answered that question of "why;" he wrote this: "They weren't able to give thanks because they hadn't learned that grace comes through the wounds. Primarily through the wounds of Christ but even through our own wounds. Gratitude doesn't arise magically if it isn't already present when times are tough. That's why St. Paul urges us to 'give thanks in all circumstances.'" Well said, and so true.

Words from Lincoln's Log. In this regard, in October 1863, in the midst of a terrible Civil War (which would claim 620,000 lives), Abraham Lincoln proclaimed that there be a Day of Thanksgiving to God each November. Lincoln issued that proclamation noting the tough circumstance our nation was in, but then went on to enumerate the many good things, the many blessings, that were also seen in the past year amidst the turmoil. Of these good things and their relation to God he wrote that they

"...should be solemnly, reverently and gratefully acknowledged as with one heart and one voice by the whole American People. I do therefore invite my fellow citizens in every part of the United States... to set apart and observe the last Thursday of November next, as a day of Thanksgiving and Praise to our beneficent Father who dwells in the Heavens."

So even in the midst of a difficult time, Abraham Lincoln commended us to give thanks to God - not lamenting what we are lacking, but rather showing gratitude for and recognizing our blessings.
