

RECEIVING THE SACRAMENTS

The seven Sacraments of the Church were instituted by Christ to confer grace.

Sacrament of Baptism. Call the parish office to register for Parent Pre-Baptismal Instruction. For adults seeking to enter the Church and be Baptized, contact our Religious Education Office.

Sacrament of Reconciliation (Confession). Children in our religious education program and school are prepared for Confession at age seven as part of First Communion preparation.

Sacrament of the Holy Eucharist. Children in our religious education program and school are prepared for First Communion at age seven. Adults seeking First Communion should contact our Religious Education Office. To request a visitation for Holy Communion to the Sick, contact our parish office.

Sacrament of Confirmation. Young people in our parish are prepared for reception of Confirmation in the ninth grade (age 14). Adults seeking Confirmation should contact our Religious Education Office.

Sacrament of Marriage. Couples planning for Marriage are to contact a parish priest or deacon one year in advance to set the wedding date and plan for pre-Cana instruction.

Sacrament of Holy Orders. If you believe you have, or someone you know has, a vocation to the Priesthood or Diaconate, please contact one of our parish priests.

Anointing of the Sick. For the Sacrament of Anointing of the Sick, which is administered by a Priest, a person or an immediate family member must make the request. Late night requests may not be able to be answered until the next day.

Dear Parishioners,

October is the month of the Holy Rosary, as established by long-standing Church tradition. The key holy day of the month was on October 7: The Memorial of Our Lady of the Rosary, though the entire month is dedicated to the Holy Rosary. Much like an Entertainment Tonight exposé on the secret life of Leif Garrett or Macauley Culkin, this feast day has a story and a story behind the story!

Here's the story of a lovely Lady. The Rosary was established by our Blessed Mother, Mary, who in the year 1214 appeared to St. Dominic in a monastery in France and commended to him the concept and practice of the Holy Rosary. In the praying of that Rosary, 150 Hail Marys would be prayed - one for every Psalm in Scripture. Pun-illy one may ask: What is the connection between those 150 Psalms and those 150 Hail Marys, pray tell? Well, Priests and those in religious life (then and now) pray multiple times daily from a book called "The Liturgy of the Hours." Completing cycle of prayers in that book, the person praying would have recited all 150 Psalms. Most lay people at the time of St. Dominic were not literate, but they did know their prayers. The Rosary allowed the people to – albeit in a variant way – to join their prayers to those of the Priests and Religious men and women. As the Priests and Religious would pray their 150 Psalms, the lay faithful would pray their 150 Hail Marys. And that's the connection!

Elementary My Dear Watson? So, may we deduce from this that on the Feast of Our Lady of Rosary we are celebrating the establishment of the Rosary, right? Well, actually, no. We are not. Hence the story behind the story!

Here's the story behind the story: Just as the Jefferson Airplane became the Jefferson Starship, the Jackson 5 became the Jacksons, and the show "Seinfeld Chronicles" became "Seinfeld," the feast day of Our Lady of the Rosary is likewise a revised name. The October 7 feast was originally known as the feast of Our Lady of Victory; it was established to celebrate a particular military victory for the forces of Christendom in Europe. As history tells us, Turkish Ottoman Empire forces had toppled the Christian Byzantine Empire in the 15th century (1453) and over the next 100 years expanded their Islamic Empire westward into Europe, conquering ever westward and ever northward. But within Europe, there was a deceptive calm in some corners about the advance. Why? Many European countries were blinded to the threat of encroaching Ottoman advances by

the seduction allure of money made from trading with that Empire and its vassal states. But the not everyone was blinded to the threat. Author Niccolò Capponi in his book, The Victory of the West: The Great Christian-Muslim Clash at the Battle of Lepanto, described the situation this way:

By the beginning of the sixteenth century Christendom was in a very sorry state. Gone were the crusading ideals of old; people turned deaf ears to the alarmed utterances of preachers and popes about the necessity of stopping the Turkish advance. For most European governments the Ottoman threat was low on their list of concerns—they were more interested in maintaining their positions in the rich eastern markets—while a few states were quite ready to abet, or at least not hinder, the sultan's expansionist policies for the sake of their own commercial interests.

A League of their Own. As noted, not everyone was oblivious to the salami-tactics (advancing slice by slice) of the Islamic forces of the Ottoman Empire. Several European powers, saw the situation not as one of trade-benefits, but as an existential threat to the Christian way of life in Europe. Fearing an Ottoman rout of Europe, three Catholic military powers (Genoa, Spain, and the Papal States) forged the Holy League, to prevent invasion and conquest. The major confrontation took place between the powers at the Battle of Lepanto, a naval battle off the coast of Greece on October 7, 1571. The Holy League was expected to be wiped out, by the larger, superior Ottoman forces, in what might be called "My Big Fat Greek Battle!"

An "Ernest" Victory. Fearing their demise, the captains and crews of the Holy League's ships intently prayed the Rosary as they readied for the battle. Pope Pius V commended the Catholic faithful to go to church to pray to the Virgin Mary, that she might pray to our Lord for a victory against the daunting Ottoman forces. Like a good review for a Nicholas Cage movie, a very unexpected victory came forth. Nearly the entire battle fleet of the Ottoman Empire had been captured or sunk by the forces of the Holy League. Following this victory, attitudes in Europe changed, and in future conflicts, more European powers would join in the battle to push the rising of Ottoman invasion back — ultimately bringing it to a halt.

Made Marian. In a gesture of prayerful thanks, Pope Pius V asserted that this victory be com-

Octubre mes del Santo Rosario. Hoy más que nunca rezar el santo Rosario es nuestra armadura más fuerte contra el dominio de Satanás. Familias que están pasando por dificultades, cualquiera que sea, recen el Rosario diariamente. El Magisterio de la Iglesia Católica recomienda el rezo del santo Rosario ya que en sí misma resume el mensaje evangélico de salvación. Por otro lado la Virgen Santísima, cuando se ha aparecido, ha pedido que recen el Rosario. Como es sabido, el 13 de mayo de 1917, en su primera aparición en Fátima, dijo: "Rezad el Rosario todos los días para alcanzar la paz del mundo y el fin de la guerra"; y en su última aparición en ese lugar la Madre de Dios se presentó como la "Señora del Rosario". Aquí tienen una reseña historia de la devoción al rezo del santo Rosario.

¿Por qué en el mes de octubre esta devoción mariana? La dedicación del mes de octubre al rezo del santo Rosario tiene un origen histórico. Los cristianos vencieron a los turcos en la batalla naval de Lepanto el 7 de octubre de 1571. Sabían que si perdían esta batalla su religión podía peligrar, motivo por el que, alentados por el romano pontífice san Pío V, acudieron a la intercesión de la Santísima Virgen rezándole el santo Rosario. Por ese motivo, y en agradecimiento a María Santísima, dicho papa instituyó la fiesta de Nuestra Señora de las Victorias, que se celebraría cada 7 de octubre. Poco más tarde el papa Gregorio XIII cambió el nombre de la fiesta por el de

Nuestra Señora del Rosario. Origen y significado de la devoción mariana del santo Rosario Pero ¿qué es el santo Rosario? Las culturas romana y griega para ellos, el sustantivo "rosario" significaban corona de rosas. Inspiradas en ese proceder, las mujeres cristianas que eran llevadas al martirio por los romanos marchaban por el Coliseo -donde iban a morir- con sus cabezas adornadas de coronas de rosas, significando la alegría y la entrega de sus corazones al ir al encuentro de Dios. Finalizada la matanza, los cristianos recogían sus coronas y, por cada rosa, recitaban una oración o un salmo rezando por el eterno descanso de las almas de las mártires asesinadas. Así nació la costumbre de rezar el santo Rosario. En un inicio consistía en recitar los 150 salmos de David, pues era considerada una oración sumamente agradable a Dios y fuente de innumerables gracias para aquellos que la rezaran. Ahora bien, esta recomendación sólo la seguían las personas cultas que conocían esos salmos, pero no la mayoría de los cristianos. Por lo tanto, Iglesia sugirió que quienes no supieran leer sustituyeran los 150 salmos por 150 Avemarías, divididas en quince decenas. A esa oración se le llamó "salterio de la Virgen". Al principio constaba de quince "misterios" que recordaban momentos gozosos, dolorosos y gloriosos- de la vida de Jesús y de María. En el año 2002 san Juan Pablo II añadió los misterios luminosos, en memoria de la vida pública del Señor.

Dear Parents,

As I go about my appointed rounds in the week I often store little tidbits away, some I write down. These little tidbits make for good fodder for when I put fingertips to keyboard in the compilation of my weekly bulletin. I have a few tidbits for this week, some of which I have brought to attention in the past but I think bear repeating.

Mrs. Kolakowski and I have begun a new practice. I stop in to her office for a purposeful discussion focused on the absentee report for the day, making comparisons to the list from the day(s) previous, we analyze the number of absent children by grade level and homeroom, and we discuss any phone calls that need be made inquiring after the students' reason for absence and state of health, bidding a speedy recovery, afterwards we proceed with the reason for my visit. It is during my visits that students might be sent to the nurse for one reason or another. Our students love Mrs. Kolakowski. One of our new students told the story of the nurse in his former school describing her as mean and grouchy. Mrs. Kolakowski is anything but mean and grouchy. She possesses a kind and gentle manner that quickly stops the teardrops from falling, takes the sting out of the hurt, and soothes the troubled with a few comforting words. It's amazing how calming a small cup of water and a band-aid can be. Before long, the boo-boo is assuaged, the student is pacified and all looks good on the horizon. Some fixes however are not as easy. Oftentimes during my visits to the ELC that I will notice a student resting. Or perhaps, I'll see a child nibbling on some of Mrs. Kolakowski's magic crackers. Not one for minding my own business, I always inquire after the reason for the child's presence in the office. It is often the case where a child complains of nausea caused by the lack of proper nutrition prior to coming to school. Last week a child stated that his breakfast consisted of a cheese stick. Another divulged that breakfast contained all the healthy nutrients found in a slice of cake. A few soda crackers later, a few minutes rest and back to class you go. It is true that mornings in the household can be hectic; it is true that we build a snack time in the morning schedule, and it is true that not all kids enjoy breakfast. But none of those reasons are good and acceptable for improperly fueling the engine prior to the onset of a demanding day. Sadly, there are those who come to school with an empty tummy. Please, please try to provide some kind of nutritious morning meal for your child, it doesn't have to be a feast; --AND, please see that your child gets enough rest in the night. We hit the ground running at 8 am. It is an unfair expectation on our part to demand their full attention and reasonable participation in class activities when they are running on empty. I tell the true story of a former student of mine who came to my class first period every day. Arriving poorly rested, it was a challenge sometimes to keep him awake. It wasn't before too much time past that I contacted his mother. "He won't eat breakfast" said his mom. I offered the opportunity to eat his breakfast during first period as long as it was done discretely. The next morning he showed up for class with breakfast in a plastic bag from a local quickie shop. Needless to say I was appalled and horrified when about 15 minutes into class, we were all treated to the crackling sound of the opening of his bag of Old Bay potato chips and the popping of the top of his can of Pepsi. True story, honest. So much for discretion, I say.

One more thing, we had a veritable monsoon last Tuesday. During dismissal, I stood protected by my umbrella; it was blatantly obvious that I was about the only one. I counted TWO students with an umbrella. I know they are a nuisance to carry around, but please give one to your child to keep in school.

My last tidbit, and changing the subject slightly, it was early Friday morning that as I backed my car in my parking spot noticing that Mrs. White had preceded my arrival. I quickly recalled that this was the day for the Rosary in the Parish Hall and she must be inside setting things up. Mrs. White had brought before the Religion Committee an idea for the recitation of the Rosary that would allow us to gather with classmates for prayer. Each homeroom teacher signed up for a particular time of day when she would take her class to the Parish Hall to pray the Rosary. As I walked into the Parish Hall the lights were off, and I was immediately bathed in a sense of peace. Our junior high students had designed diorama displays of scenes depicting the Blessed Mother. I had seen some of the work in progress during dismissal. But when I walked into the Parish Hall and saw the final result, I could not have been more pleased. Before my eyes was a Rosary comprised of miniature replicas of the Blessed Mother. The entire Rosary was depicted. Laid out, it encompassed most of the real estate that is the Parish Hall. There were battery operated candles illuminating the room; it was the only light needed. It created such a peaceful mood, one just perfect for prayer and meditation. I walked the perimeter crouching down to look at the detail, the silk flowers, the three-dimensional figures. Stepping in several times throughout the day, I was moved within to see the children seated criss-cross applesauce around the entire perimeter of the display reciting the prayer.

Tid-bits don't usually amount to much. However, it is my hope that you will find these tid-bits informational, as well as helpful.

Blessings, Mrs. Pollitt memorated by the faithful annually, as show of thankfulness for God's blessing, through Mary, Our Lady of Victory. And thus, in 1571, this Marian feast day began to be celebrated prayerfully by the faithful, in thanksgiving for a successful battle which served to protect Europe and all of Christendom from Islamic conquest.

A Moving Experience. This feast day was later re-named as Feast of the Holy Rosary, changing the emphasis from the victory in that battle, to the power of prayer in our lives. Soon thereafter, this feast was designated to be celebrated at all Masses on the first Sunday of October. In the early 20th century, Pope St. Pius X moved the celebration off of Sunday, and moved back to the date of that victory at Battle of Lepanto (October 7). A final change to this feast came in 1960, when Pope St. John XXIII renamed this holy day from "Feast of the Holy Rosary" to "Feast of Our Lady of the Rosary."

Being Indulgent. So, a military battle was won, and yadda, yadda, yadda, October is now observed as the month of the Holy Rosary. It is a month when we, as Catholics, are commended to pray the Rosary, especially when a problem seems particularly daunting, or a battle we are fighting seems un-winnable. When we pray the Rosary, Our Blessed Mother will pray for us and with us to our Lord Jesus Christ, who will give us the ultimate victory. And so, in this month of the Holy Rosary, we are reminded of God's power in the Church's history and victories, and are likewise reminded of that power of prayer we wield, especially in the Rosary — it is a bulwark against evil, and a protector against temptation and the power of the Devil.

I would remind all of you that the Church extends to us a plenary indulgence "if the rosary is recited in a Church or public oratory, or in a family group, a religious community or pious association." (Enchiridion of Indulgences, No. 48).

A Final Thought. In the Senate Chamber in the old Republic of Venice, there is a Latin inscription in reference to this feast day that sums its meaning up beautifully: "Non virtus, non arma, non duces, sed Maria Rosari, victores nos fecit" (translation: "it was neither courage, nor arms, nor leaders, but Mary of the Rosary that made us victors"). Our Lady of the Rosary, pray for us!
