

RECEIVING THE SACRAMENTS

The seven Sacraments of the Church were instituted by Christ to confer grace.

Sacrament of Baptism. Call the office to register for Parent Pre-Baptismal Instruction. For adults seeking to enter the Church and be Baptized, contact our Religious Education Office.

Sacrament of Reconciliation (Confession).

Children in our religious education program and school are prepared for Confession at age seven as part of First Communion preparation.

Sacrament of the Holy Eucharist. Children in our religious education program and school are prepared for First Communion at age seven. Adults seeking First Communion should contact our Religious Education Office. To request a visitation for Holy Communion to the Sick, contact our parish office.

Sacrament of Confirmation. Young people in our parish are prepared for reception of Confirmation in the ninth grade (age 14). Adults seeking Confirmation should contact our Religious Education Office.

Sacrament of Marriage. Couples planning for Marriage are to contact a parish priest or deacon one year in advance to set the wedding date and plan for pre-Cana instruction.

Sacrament of Holy Orders. If you believe you have, or someone you know has, a vocation to the Priesthood or Diaconate, please contact one of our parish priests.

Anointing of the Sick. For the Sacrament of Anointing of the Sick, which is administered by a Priest, a person or an immediate family member must make the request. Late night requests may not be able to be answered until the next day.

Dear Parishioners,

When I was a very young boy, the Verrazano-Narrows Bridge opened up, connecting Brooklyn and Staten Island. It was an amazing bridge — the longest suspension bridge in the world, as a matter of fact. But something else was different about it: It had a toll. No other bridges connecting two boroughs of New York City ever had a toll to that point in time. This one did: 25 cents. The word around said that the toll was temporary, enacted to help pay off the high cost of the bridge's construction.

How Big an Increase? The only thing temporary about that toll was it being 25 cents. That toll today, via Toll-by-Mail, is over \$22. It crept up on the user over time, slyly and slowly, but that 8700% increase (I'm not making that up) happened right under our noses.

Security Issues. When I was in elementary school, in sixth or seventh grade (I forget which), I received my Social Security Card (I had it laminated and still have it today). It was issued by the now-defunct Department of Health, Education and Welfare. Upon its being issued to me and my classmates, we were advised that this card was not to be used for identification purposes; it was only to be used in conjunction with the Social Security program and should be kept in a secure place.

Everyone Wants to Know. Well, the "not to be used for identification" idea gradually went out the window. My first experience of this change was in college, when, for privacy's sake, our grades were posted up after finals, not listing our grades by our names. No! Instead, they listed our grades by our social security numbers (again, I'm not making this up). After that, banks, credit card companies, medical services, and just about everyone began asking for your Social Security number. Everyone wants to know it (especially hackers). Like the bridge toll I spoke of, this change crept up on us over time, slyly and slowly, but it happened right under our noses.

Respect Life Month. In this Respect Life Month, I must reflect that in my lifetime, the change in the respect for human life similarly crept up on us over time, slyly and slowly, but it happened right under our noses. It started with the universal availability of birth control, then the legalization of abortion, then the rise In Vitro Fertilization, then the rise of euthanasia for the terminally ill, followed quickly by the rise of euthanasia in general, then the rise in the acceptance of suicide, and the list goes on and on. Sixty-five years ago, every item I just mentioned was a criminal act, while today, a portion of the populace sees these things as right and proper.

What's Next? I can remember in the 1990s, even abortion advocates counseled that abortions should be "safe, legal, and rare," but that is no more. Today, abortion advocates see abortion as something to be celebrated. What the heck has happened here? And more pointedly: what's next?

Meanwhile, Across the Pond. To see how far the moral compass has degraded, I'll give you a preview of what's coming next by conveying to you a story from across the pond in England. I always say that often, what starts over there comes here. So think of this not just as a terrible tale but as a cautionary one, as well.

The Story of Patricia. This is a story about a woman named Patricia. Patricia is a 24-year-old woman. It happens that Patricia suffers from Anorexia. For those unfamiliar with this illness, Anorexia is an eating disorder caused by a serious mental health condition. People who suffer with Anorexia have a distorted body image — that is, they feel that they are overweight when, in fact, in many cases, they are emaciated. To use a phrase that should be used more often today: Their feelings are wrong. Just because you imagine something to be so doesn't make it so.

Summary Judgment. In any event, 24-year-old Patricia has been allowed to choose to die by a judge. This is the case, even though it was observed that Patricia is out of it (probably from hunger) and that she is "lacking the capacity to take decisions" concerning her medical treatment.

Of Food and Water. Patricia has a Body Mass Index of about eight (this is not a misprint) from basically starving herself to reduce her imaginary weight problem. Last year, Patricia had signed an "advance directive" last year refusing life-saving care. Many people sign such documents — an example of this would be a dying cancer patient signing a "DNR" or "Do Not Resuscitate" order. In other words, they do not want extraordinary measures to be taken to keep them alive. But, as you would imagine, "extraordinary measures" normally would not include food and hydration.

Decisions, Decisions. The matter was taken to a judge, who ruled that even though Patricia was too sick to make decisions about her care, she should be allowed to make the decision to discontinue treatment. To quote him, "Patricia, at present, lacks capacity to take decisions as to her medical treatment." Now, I will add commentary here: I never thought of food and water as treatment — I thought of it as part of life.

Meet the Parents. Patricia's parents weighed in, seeking a reversal of this life-ending ruling. The judge budged not; he ruled that Patricia could be sent home, given only palliative (pain medication)

They are there. Are they invisible to those who walk by? Invisible to those who drive by at a speed that exceeds the limit? To drivers who turn onto Scull Terrace? Look! They are right there! Are they invisible to you? I hope not. Because they are there. Maybe it's because they are small in size? Or maybe because they are placed in a bit of a swale on the grassy side in front of the hedgerow on State Street?

Invisible. Unseen, overlooked, unnoticed, or just plain ignored. Like the lives of countless aborted children---

Every October eighth grade members of our National Junior Honor Society place no less than one hundred white crosses in and around the swale on the grassy side in the front of the hedgerow on State Street. These white crosses will remain in plain view of all who pass by in memory of those whose lives have been cut short prior to birth.

I first saw a collection of white crosses placed outside of a Catholic Church I once attended. I was in awe as I walked the pathway to the church entrance. As I rounded a bend there were more crosses. The crosses were placed over the entire property of the church. It seemed like hundreds. The entire landscape of the church was a sea of white crosses. But, I did not know why. It was an imposing, almost (dare I say?) majestic sight.

Little did I know that this impressively large collection of simple white crosses stood in memory of those without a voice, those without a choice.

The collection of simple white crosses is known as a Cemetery of the Innocents. When I learned of the meaning of this memorial, I wanted our school to be one of the communities to pay homage in a similar manner.



Mrs. Riecks and Mrs. Wojtkiewicz were Honor Society moderators at the time. I approached them with the proposal that our NJHS members build and paint the crosses that would be "planted" each October in memory of lives lost to abortion. It was a tall order. Time being one of the biggest considerations. In the end, Mr. Bill Wojtkiewicz created all the crosses we still use today.

And so it has been in the past couple of weeks, I've listened to a loud rumbling sound round the corner of the office---every day at the same time. It is the large empty wagon that thirty minutes previous had been loaded with white crosses. Pulling the wagon is an eighth grade NJHS

student accompanied by his peers, hammers in hand while Mrs. Peek followed closely behind. It is during their recess time that the students work in the construction of the Holy Cross School memorial honoring those babies who were never given a chance.

They are there. Are they invisible to all who pass by?

Blessed art thou among women.

Holy Mary, Mother of God,
Pray for us sinners, now and at the hour of our death.

care at home. Again, to add comment, wouldn't food and water, in this case, be palliative? That is, wouldn't it mitigate the pains of hunger and dehydration?

Fragile. Her parents and other relatives noted that Patricia is in such a fragile mental condition that she changes her mind day to day, moment to moment. One relative noted that it seemed as if "No one told the judge that [Patricia] is changing her mind every five minutes... You can't just go off the last thing she said; what about the fact that, in her own words, she has been 'screaming for help' for weeks?" According to others, Patricia herself was telling her family the exact opposite – that she wanted to be fed and wanted to be medicated. In other words, she wants to be able to get food. In her moment of lucidity, she knew what she needed. The additional problem of the judge's ruling is that, going forward, it makes it difficult now for Patricia to seek any help again.

Number Six. According to what I have read in the matter of 24-year-old Patricia, in the United Kingdom, she is the sixth eating disorder patient in the past few years who has been allowed to indulge in her fantasy of being overweight and starving herself to death. Unlike the others, as I write this, she is still alive.

A Doctor's Proscription. A woman named Dr. Agnes Ayton is a member of the Royal College of Psychiatrists and is a co-author of the U.K.'s national guidelines for treating eating disorders like Anorexia. Dr. Ayton notes that the guidelines state that a malnourished anorexia patient "does not have capacity" to sign an advance directive to refuse treatment. She says, "A patient who has a longstanding eating disorder does not have capacity to sign [an advance directive] when they are ill and malnourished... they should only sign [one] when they are no longer malnourished at which point the patient is very unlikely to want to sign."

Do No Harm. A long story and a painful story. It is one of hunger — the physical hunger of the Anorexia patient and the spiritual hunger of the faithful seeking a world in which life is valued. Not disposable. While this story is long, it is also instructive on how far down we have slid as a world when it comes to protecting human life. The primordial, traditional call of a medical practitioner is "First, do no harm."

Of Preying and Praying. But imagine, we went from aborting the child in the womb (who is unseen) to now setting up the death of a 24-year-old woman (who is right before our eyes) with a mental health condition — who mistakenly believes she is overweight and won't eat. The point I make is that the purveyors of death prey on the weakest among us — seen and unseen — to visit death like a grim reaper. We need to pray for those who prey on the weakest among us, and we need to make them see their actions for what they are: murderous. Let me not mince words here. A person who allows, and indeed greases the skids for, a young person in the prime of life to starve herself to death because she is mentally ill is causing the taking of human life.

Conception to Natural Death. As Catholics, we believe life is from conception to natural death - a person who is starved to death should not count as a natural death. During this Respect Life Month, let us focus not only on abortion (the scourge of our lifetime) and euthanasia (aka assisted suicide), but let us also be aware of and wary of the trend to deprive people of health. To allow them to be sick... to allow them to die... and then to pretend it was an act of care and compassion. How twisted is that?

Back to the Beginning. To go back to my original point, if when the Verrazano-Narrows Bridge was built, the government established a toll of \$22, there would have been an outrage, protests, and a pressuring of public officials never to allow tolls again. If, when the Social Security Card was established, folks were made to see that everything they do would be tracked by this number that was said should not be used to track anything, there would have been a national kerfuffle... yes, I say it again because I like the word ... a kerfuffle about violations of privacy. Those two changes crept up on us over time, slyly and slowly, but happened right under our noses. And they are hard to reverse.

A Line in the Sand. Respect Life Month is a time for us to battle much more than a toll or a tracking number; it is a time to commit ourselves to the restoration of respect for human life — the greatest of all life on this planet. The most precious life of all. We must start by drawing lines in the sand and saying "no further." Perhaps if that had been done a few years ago, Patricia would not be dying in her bed by starvation. My brothers and sisters in Christ: Respect life.
