

# RECEIVING THE SACRAMENTS

The seven Sacraments of the Church were instituted by Christ to confer grace.

**Sacrament of Baptism.** Call the office to register for Parent Pre-Baptismal Instruction. For adults seeking to enter the Church and be Baptized, contact our Religious Education Office.

Sacrament of Reconciliation (Confession). Children in our religious education program and school are prepared for Confession at age seven as part of First Communion preparation.

Sacrament of the Holy Eucharist. Children in our religious education program and school are prepared for First Communion at age seven. Adults seeking First Communion should contact our Religious Education Office. To request a visitation for Holy Communion to the Sick, contact our parish office.

Sacrament of Confirmation. Young people in our

parish are prepared for reception of Confirmation in the ninth grade (age 14). Adults seeking Confirmation should contact our Religious Education Office.

Sacrament of Marriage. Couples planning for Marriage are to contact a parish priest or deacon one year in advance to set the wedding date and plan for pre-Cana instruction.

Sacrament of Holy Orders. If you believe you have, or someone you know has, a vocation to the Priesthood or Diaconate, please contact one of our parish priests.

Anointing of the Sick. For the Sacrament of Anointing of the Sick, which is administered by a Priest, a person or an immediate family member must make the request. Late night requests may not be able to be answered until the next day.

Dear Parishioners,

With All Saints Day (focused on our Saints in Heaven) and All Souls Day (focused on the Poor Souls in Purgatory) just a few days away —November 1 and November 2, respectively—this is a good time to explore the vast expanse of our Church. Thus, this column be about the Church in Heaven, on Earth and in Purgatory—reminding us that wherever God's people are, there is the Church.

States! We have 50 of them in the United States. And each one of them has something to boast about. Hawaii is the state with the greatest life expectancy. Pennsylvania is the state with the most hunters. Mississippi has the most churches per capita. Maryland has the highest income. California has the highest income tax. Florida has the most retirees. Wyoming has the cleanest air. North Dakota has the most persons per capita over 100 years of age. Delaware has the most incorporations; 66% of all of the Fortune 500 companies. Missouri is bordered by more other states than any other state; it is bordered by eight states (hence, "Missouri" loves company).

Moving Stories. So, going from state to state, there are certainly differences to be found, and yet all are still American soil. Visiting or moving to different states allows one to see the differences up close. When I moved from New York to Delaware, for instance, I learned that Harrington has only two syllables (Harn-ton) and Smyrna has three (Sa-mer-na). In each state there are difference and similarity – the latter (similarity) being what binds us as Americans.

What Gives You Gas? In science, there are also "states" – ways of being – as distinct and similar as our US states. For example, I am sure we all learned in elementary school science water exists in three states: solid (ice), liquid (Perrier or Aquafina) and gas (steam). It exists in three different manners or "states" – and yet it is still H20.

Holy Places. Similarly, the Catholic Church exists in three "states" – it exists as the Church here on Earth, as the Church in Heaven and as the Church in Purgatory. As I noted earlier, wherever God's people are, there is the Church. While there are similarities between each state, there are also distinctions. In that regard, here is a brief overview regarding the three states in which the Church exists:

• The Church Triumphant (The Church in Heaven). When talking about the communion of saints we most often think of the saints in Heaven. These are those souls that rest in peace before the face of God, gathered around the Lamb, Jesus Christ. This is the Catholic Church in Heaven is called Triumphant because its members have won the battle of earthly life, and now stand before the Beatific Vision of God. They are freed of all taint of sin, being fully

holy, fully knowing and loving God and seeing Christ, no longer under the veil of a Sacrament, but face-to-face. Any doubt experienced in earthly faith is washed away.

The Church Suffering (The Church in Purgatory). When talking about the communion of saints we probably least often think of those suffering souls in Purgatory. The Catholic Church in Purgatory is made up of those members of the Church Militant who died with temporal punishment due for sin. The way they are made purified for the Kingdom of Heaven is by abiding in Purgatory and facing those aspects of their life and their soul that keep them "not yet ready" for Heaven. In Purgatory, the members of the Communion of Saints are purged of any obstacles preventing them from seeing clearly, God, as he is.

• The Church Militant (The Church on Earth). This is the Church that is the people of God on Earth; it known as the Church Militant, as we on Earth as still fighting the battle of daily life to win the victorious crown given saints in Heaven. In this Church, we strive for holiness; to come to know, love and serve God. Here we receive Christ, but under the veil of a Sacrament.

Three in One. Let me be clear, the Church in Heaven, on Earth and in Purgatory are one-in-the-same the Catholic Church. Much as the Father, the Son and the Holy Spirit are three persons in one God, so the Church, though existing in three states is nonetheless one Church. The essence of the Church is the same "on Earth as it is in Heaven." Thus, there is only one Church – the Catholic Church: it is one, holy, Catholic and apostolic. The key element of the Church when speaking in terms of it being a communion is word "one."

The Churchless Place. It is worth mentioning that there is one place where the Church doesn't exist. It is that place which we dread: Hell. In Hell, we find the absence of God (or better putting people absenting themselves from God). It is there, where the perpendicular pronoun ("I") is the only one used — for it is a painful isolation from God and the Church. Hell is the reminder to us that we need to straighten up and fly right, as the old song, commends. We are taught that there is "no salvation outside the Church" — Hell is that place outside the Church. But let's leave Hell in our rearview mirror and look, rather, at the blessing of the Church God has given... and see how Heaven, Earth and Purgatory are especially connected.



It was a brief time away, just under forty-eight hours. My husband and I drove to Lancaster, PA where we were welcomed by the beautiful rolling landscapes, the splendor of the fall foliage, and the inhabitants of the area who worship our God with a quiet zeal, but in an entirely different manner from many. They live a simple life, all unto themselves without asking or expecting anything of the "outside world." There are stories told of the incredible barn-raisings when an entire structure is recreated in a twenty four hour period following a disastrous, fiery event in the Amish community without any signs of first responders, other than friends and neighbors. A tightly-bound community who lives by deeply-rooted and traditional values, I wonder how they view assistance from local fire fighters or law enforcement agencies in times of need. I admit to having a certain fascination with the Amish, I hold a deep admiration for their steadfastness and perseverance; their resolve in keeping to their own and their complete disregard for the values, modern conveniences, and beliefs of the outside world.

On the other hand, however, I would shutter to think that in their adherence to the simple life and turning the back to the mores of the communities at large, that local first-responders would not be sought out or quickly summoned to an emergency situation.

During our brief absence from home, our kind neighbor saw to the many needs of our cats. She explained that while she served as the feline caretaker, her biggest fear was that something would go wrong in the house. Fire, flood, wind, or some other pestilence would fall upon the House of Pollitt while she was left in charge. Not an entirely irrational fear, I suppose. However, with local first-responders near enough by, at least a response would be immediate enough. Tragic, nonetheless and pray God it doesn't happen to any of us.

But it does sort of beg the question; where would we be without our First Responders? It is indeed a frightening scenario where we are left to our own devices during a traumatic situation. I recall the onset of the use of the emergency 911 call number. I was in eighth grade at the time. My grandmother was very clear in her instruction to us as she ripped away the yellowing piece of note pad paper that was taped alongside the telephone on which was written all the different seven-digit emergency numbers for all of the local responders. The Police Department, Fire Department, and the Ambulance service being the top three. The whole concept of three digits was revolutionary. I guess it only made sense that emergency calls be received in as little time as a call for telephone number information (411) which had been in use for years. Even the time of day (for heavens sakes!) could be obtained with a three-digit number!

So, it wasn't a 911 call that was put out to local responders in Dover, but over the past several weeks plans have been in process for what has come to be an annual event at Holy Cross. One that doesn't seem to grow old. We look for ways of building onto First Responders Day as we invite new agencies to take part. The Robbins Hose Fire Department in Dover was joined by representation of the Dover City Police Department and the Delaware State Police. The friendly EMT's form the St. Francis Paramedic Service were especially engaged with the children as they demonstrated emergency procedure, and allowed tours of the ambulance interior. I learned a lot of new information about the Department of Corrections as we visited with and listened to Probation and Correctional Officers who informed us of their duties and methods in which they assist local law enforcement in response to emergency situations. We met Trooper Dan for the first time this year. Trooper Dan is a Delaware Blue VW bug, atop of which sits the signature trooper hat of large proportion. Trooper Dan visits all kinds of local events, participates in parades, and was nice enough to make some time for us on our FR Day. Trooper Dan is driven by Corporal Jones who commented on the manners and good questions posed by our students. It's always a thrill to watch the DSP Helicopter descend onto the green grass behind the ELC and listen to the stories told by the pilots before walking over to the demonstrations of police heroism performed by the members of the force with four paws. The officers tell the students about the training process required for each canine before becoming an active member of the force. This precedes a demonstration of their talents and contributions made to the department as they play a key role in drug enforcement laws, bomb detection, and human pursuit. The motorcycles are always a big hit, and our own Officer Knight gave each child an opportunity to use the police car radio, just like he does when he has to call out to the bad guys.

We are grateful to our First Responders, and it is vitally important that our students grow up learning an appreciation for what they do to keep our community safe. Grateful, too am I to Mr. and Mrs. Klaus for their assistance in the planning of the day as well as making the arrangements for lunch from Mission Barbecue. Many thanks to our HSA for picking up the tab!

It was a great day for all involved, the weather was picture perfect and all responders seemed to enjoy interacting with the students.

**Relating Heaven, Earth and Purgatory.** In 1985, a singer named Belinda Carlisle topped the charts with a song called "Heaven is a Place on Earth." Now, as heretical as that title might sound in doctrinaire terms, there is a touch of truth in it. At Mass, we celebrate the feast of Heaven and Earth; it is a reflection of the heavenly banquet, with Christ as its center, and the saints gathered in ascendant praise. Likewise, at Mass we pray for the souls in Purgatory. And so, Mass brings all three states of the Church into view for us, around the Sacrifice of Christ.

All Saints Day. In this regard, on Wednesday, November 1, we celebrate the Solemnity of All Saints. The celebration ranks high on the Church calendar as a solemnity – specifically, a Holy Day of Obligation. On All Saints Day we honor the Saints in Heaven — in the Church Triumphant. However, as much as we honor them, we do even more: we, in fact, strive to one day join them. The collect (opening prayer) for Mass that on All Saints Day expresses that desire: "Almighty ever-living God, by whose gift we venerate in one celebration the merits of all the Saints, bestow on us, we pray, through the prayers of so many intercessors, an abundance of the reconciliation with you for which we earnestly long. Through our Lord Jesus Christ…"

All Souls Day. The day after we celebrate the Church Triumphant, we turn our gaze to the Church Suffering as we observe All Souls Day. On that day, we remember all the faithful departed in Purgatory and pray that they may rest in the peace of Heaven. The collect for All Souls Day expresses this hope: "Listen kindly to our prayers, O Lord, and, as our faith in your Son, raised from the dead, is deepened, so may our hope of resurrection for your departed servants also find new strength. Through our Lord Jesus Christ..." Similarly, The Roman Martyrology, the Church's official listing of all of our saints, indicates that All Souls Day is when we are called to offer our prayers for "all those who still groan in Purgatory, so that they may join as soon as possible the inhabitants of the heavenly city."

**A Moving Experience.** Regarding joining "the inhabitants of the heavenly city," it is the inherent desire of those in the Church on Earth is to get to the Church in Heaven. But, this is not like moving from one parish to another because of better air conditioning, better music or no second collections. No! It is an inherent desire; it is the natural progression to which we are called.

**Preparing for Company.** However (and isn't there always a "however"), in order to make the move from this world to the Kingdom of God in Heaven and abide with and in the company of Saints, we have to be rightly prepared: We need to be in a state of grace, and we need to have no temporal punishments due for sin on our dance card. In this world, we cleanse ourselves of those problems by the Sacraments of Confession and the Eucharist and by the gaining of Indulgences, respectively. In this regard:

- · Confession puts us in a state of grace by cleansing us from all of our sins (especially mortal sins which serve to break our relationship with God).
- The Eucharist nourishes us and cleanses us from venial (lesser) sins.
- · The gaining of Indulgences (gifts of God's grace) by good deeds, prayers and actions, wipes away our Temporal Punishment due for the sins we have committed.

Purgatory and the Tonight Show. But what if we do, in fact, still have venial sins upon us (un-repented) or temporal punishment due for sin at the time of death? Purgatory cleanses us. It prepares us. It is like getting one's self all clean and prepped for a prom, a wedding, or a date with Scarlett Johansson. I have often likened Purgatory to the famous "Green Room" back stage on The Tonight Show. It seems that back stage at the Tonight Show there is a room, dubbed the "Green Room," in which the guests for the evening remain-in-waiting until they are called to come on stage and go on air with Jimmy Fallon. In that room, that "Green Room," they wait, they prepare and look forward to that big moment when they are moved from the "Green Room" to the big room... to the set of the Tonight Show. This is much like what Purgatory is for us: it's a waiting place, a place where God preps you and purgates (purges, cleanses) you of anything that would keep you from enjoying the awe and wonder of Heaven.

**High Hopes.** And so, for our loved ones who have passed on, we hope – but do not know – they are in Heaven, and so we are called to pray that they make that journey. Our default setting when someone dies is one of charity: to pray for their soul; to pray that they get to their place in the Heavenly kingdom (the Church Triumphant). We are a people of hope! Much like Frank Sinatra crooned in 1959, we've "got high hopes." and on All Saints Day and All Souls Day, like author H.G. Wells, we ponder, with hope, those "Things to Come." Amen!
