

RECEIVING THE SACRAMENTS

The seven Sacraments of the Church were instituted by Christ to confer grace.

Sacrament of Baptism. Call the parish office to register for Parent Pre-Baptismal Instruction. For adults seeking to enter the Church and be Baptized, contact our Religious Education Office.

Sacrament of Reconciliation (Confession). Children in our religious education program and school are prepared for Confession at age seven as part of First Communion preparation.

Sacrament of the Holy Eucharist. Children in our religious education program and school are prepared for First Communion at age seven. Adults seeking First Communion should contact our Religious Education Office. To request a visitation for Holy Communion to the Sick, contact our parish office.

Sacrament of Confirmation. Young people in our parish are prepared for reception of Confirmation in the ninth grade (age 14). Adults seeking Confirmation should contact our Religious Education Office.

Sacrament of Marriage. Couples planning for Marriage are to contact a parish priest or deacon one year in advance to set the wedding date and plan for pre-Cana instruction.

Sacrament of Holy Orders. If you believe you have, or someone you know has, a vocation to the Priesthood or Diaconate, please contact one of our parish priests.

Anointing of the Sick. For the Sacrament of Anointing of the Sick, which is administered by a Priest, a person or an immediate family member must make the request. Late night requests may not be able to be answered until the next day.

I enjoy writing — I do. Moreover, I am always enchanted by the multiplicity of nuances found in the English language which I deploy in my writing — plays on words, shades of meaning, byzantine sentence structuring, etc. All of this is what makes writing so very, very enjoyable for me.

Spinning a Webster. But alas, sometimes, a tear flows from my eye, and Noah Webster can be heard spinning in his grave, as a degradation of the language occurs. In recent years, the wounding of English, my mother tongue, has accelerated via the rise of texting (and similar social media communication). This new incarnation of our English language is gooped up in a web of arcane abbreviations, shortcuts, and acronyms too numerous to count.

Weeping for Words. There are certain moments in the decline of our English language that stand out in my mind. One in particular happened about seven years ago, when I speaking with a college student who, in the course of discussion, stated how he had "conversated with some friends about his new classes." I remember saying to him, "You did what with your friends?" He repeated that he "conversated" with them. Following a round of smelling salts, I came back to consciousness and reminded him that he meant that he "had a conversation with some friends." He said, "It means the same thing." Paraphrasing St. John's Gospel 11:35: And Fr. Lentini wept.

Xerox was Copied. We also have the heinous practice today of turning nouns into verbs. Truly, I don't want to hear one more person talk about "calendaring" (vs. putting it in my calendar); "impacting" (vs. making an impact); "tasking," (vs. assigning a task); and "solutioning" (vs. finding a solution). No do I want to hear student athletes who make it to the finals in a sporting competition announce that they "finalled." I blame the Xerox Corporation for all of this. Why? Because their name went from a proper noun (Xerox Corp.), to a common noun (I made a xerox of the document), to an adjective (I made a xerox copy of it), finally, to a verb (I'm xeroxing the pages). With our young generation that terminology has died (copying or photocopying has taken its place), but I still blame Xerox — much like Sir Edmund Hillary climbing Mount Everest, once it was proved it could done, others followed suit (dare I say, they copied).

An Assaulted Pretzel. Why does all this annoy me so much? Aside from the desecration of a beautiful language — the language of Shakespeare, Wordsworth, Whitman, Keats, Cooper, Twain and so many others —it bothers me because words mean things. And when we assault the language and twist words into a pretzel for sake of convenience and laziness (rather than for poetic license or craft) we take what was meant to be a pretzel rod, and turn it into in twisted pretzel, which it was not meant to be. And we also diminish a word's value, origin and intended meaning.

Speaking Germane. Why is it bad to diminish a word's value, origin and intended meaning? Because then words no longer mean things, and the intent of a word can be subjugated to whim; pre-

cision of meaning dies. For instance, is "calendaring" putting a date on your calendar or is it making a calendar? More germane to October (as it is Respect Life Month) is the word phoetus (rendered these days as fetus). That word used to be technical term for a human child in the womb; it has now been effectively morphed into meaning "a thing" in the womb—the word has been stripped of its humanity and human connotation, so much so that pro-life folks like me don't even use the term anymore, because the meaning of the word has morphed, and has taken on a dark overtone.

Giving Your Word. But words are important — they are signifiers of meaning. They are signifiers of expressions of truth. So, important are words, that Jesus Christ is called the Word made flesh. Scripture is the Word of God. And, in human terms, when we speak honestly we give someone our word... and that word we give means something. And so, with all of this banter about words, I want to write a little bit about words and terms that we use that find their origin, etymology or back story in Sacred Scripture — the Word of God — or in Biblical history.

Scapegoat - We use the term "Scapegoat" for a person who takes the blame for something that isn't his fault. But did you know that there was an actual goat, a real live goat, that was a scapegoat? It comes from Biblical history. Back in the day, God ordained a particular day during which the entire nation of Israel would set aside work, and during which the priests would atone for the sin of the whole nation. Among the rituals prescribed was the use of the scapegoat. What was this Ritual? The priest was instructed to lay his hands on a goat (dubbed a scape) and confess the nation's sins over it. Then the goat was chased off into the wilderness, to where it would "e-scape," carrying off the sins of the people with it. This can be referenced in Leviticus 16:8-10 (some translations use the word "scapegoat" others, just "goat").

Talent. We use this word in reference to one's natural abilities. But you have also probably heard of this word being used a bit differently in the Bible. In the Gospel of St. Matthew 25:14-34 we hear of the parable of the talents. The "talents" spoken of in that parable were units of money. In that parable told by Jesus, a Master gives three of his servants five talents, two talents and one talent respectively, with the intent they use them to make a return on this money. The first two servants do well, and get a good return by their investing of the talents. But the last guy, the guy with one talent, buries it and does nothing with it (making no return on it). When the Master returns he hands him back the one talent, the Master gives him a smack in the back of the head and says, "What the heck is this you big schmegegge? You did nothing with the one talent I gave you." The moral of the story: We are called to use those things that God gives us in order to serve him. As this parable has evolved along with our language, talents have come to mean abilities we have been invested with. Thus, we are to use our "talents," (our natural abilities) given to us by the Master.

Simony. This is a word that refers to the buying or selling of Church offices (jobs, titles, positions,

I have two stories to tell. Both stories tell of two special young women who have certainly touched my life, and the lives of others in their role as Catholic educators, in their response to the call to serve. Strangely enough, in both stories you will find the common theme; all good things come to those who wait.

STORY NUMBER 1 - HC has always been my home and I am PROUD and happy that my girls can say the same. Rosanna Zappulo

"I'm waiting..... come on now...." tapping my fingernails on the countertop. It could have been any day of the school week when Mrs. Zappulo would walk hurriedly through the doors to pick up her oldest daughter, Giusy. Typically, she would have Gaia on her right hip as the two of them ascended the steps through to the elementary building to find Giusy. Oftentimes she was also there to retrieve her niece, Annachiara and her nephew, Vasco as well as I was standing there poised to harass. Her sincere and emphatic response would be something along the line of "I know, I'm trying!" or "I'm getting there, I promise...don't worry!" As my former student, I felt I had every right to harass her and she knew it was good natured. Good natured or not though, I WAS waiting for her to complete her degree and acquire the initial qualifications for hire. Understanding that she played the role of full time wife and mother, family business partner, and full time student, not to mention her obligations to the extended family I patiently awaited the day when she would come on board as faculty. Her road was a long one. Following her graduation from Holy Cross, Rosanna attended Polytech High School and Del Tech Community College. Upon graduation, in keeping with family tradition she traveled to Italy for a few years where she met and married her husband. Returning to the United States, as Rosanna relays "I knew it was time for me to fulfill my dream of becoming a teacher and finally making my mother proud." etc.) and goes back to a period in Church history long gone, where that was commonly done. But that word simony goes back even further! It goes back to Act of the Apostles, 8:17-20, regarding a man named Simon who was a sorcerer. The passage has him witnessing the Apostles engaging in the laying on of hands: "Then they laid hands on them and they received the holy Spirit. When Simon saw that the Spirit was conferred by the laying on of the apostles' hands, he offered them money and said, "Give me this power too, so that anyone upon whom I lay my hands may receive the holy Spirit." But Peter said to him, "May your money perish with you, because you thought that you could buy the gift of God with money." Thus from Simon's attempt to purchase the power of the Sacred, we get the word simony.

Apocalypse. This word, when used today, tends to mean a time or an event of great destruction, or even the end of the world. However, the last book in the Bible, Revelation, is also called the Apocalypse of St. John. The word apocalypse comes from the Greek apo meaning "un" and kaluptein meaning "covered" — apokaluptein thus meaning "uncovered" or "revealed." Thus Apocalypse is word that really does mean "revelation" — for in St. John's writing he reveals the battle between good and evil that will demarcate the end times

Aha. When you catch someone doing something they shouldn't — like stealing a cookie from the cookie jar — you might yell, "Aha." The meaning of that exclamation is roughly taken as "caught you." But that's not the origin of the word. "Aha" might win the award for the word with biggest change in meaning over time—kind of — though the original meaning is just under the surface. "Aha" appears first in Psalm 35:20-21, "They speak no words of peace, but against the quiet in the land, they fashion deceitful speech. They open wide their mouths against me. They say, "Aha! Good! Our eyes have seen it!" In this passage, the word "Aha" is not a nice word in its true form. It comes from the Hebrew "achach" literally meaning a hot room; but when said to someone back in the day, (as in this Psalm) it meant the equivalent of "go to Hell." Oh, my!

"A Little Bird Told Me." When someone repeats something someone told them (often gossip), they'll say something like, "A little bird told me that you got a new job." While we use this phrase as a cute way of saying "someone shared this information with me," its origin is not cute in tone at all — it actually comes from an admonition, a Divine warning, in Scripture. In Ecclesiastes 10:20, we are told "Even in your thoughts do not curse the king, nor in the privacy of your bedroom curse the rich; for the birds of the air may carry your voice, a winged creature may tell what you say." Those little birds are such yentas!

Jezebel. In the TV show "Cheers," bar-regular Norm once noted that when he started dating his future wife, Vera, he heard that she had loose morals — but then learned that in fact, she actually only had a dental problem of loose molars. But a woman of loose morals is oft dubbed a "jezebel." But there is more to the story than that. You may remember in scripture there was a false god known as Baal — and evil force. Well, in Old Testament times when one wanted to summon Baal (the way people might summon the Devil using the black arts), they would begin the summoning ritual saying: "Where is the Prince?" (a reference to Baal). In Hebrew, that phrase (where is the prince?) is expressed by a variant of the word "jezebel." One who utters it, to call on the false god Baal, is being unfaithful to the one true God. King Ahab's wife, Jezebel, promoted Baal worship in Israel to lure the Jewish people away from Yahweh — and so that ceremonial word became associated with her name, or her name became that ceremonial word (a chicken-and-egg conundrum). In any event, because of this Baal worshipping woman, an unfaithful woman oft bear the epithet, "Jezebel." Thus her name has become a byword — but I guess that's just the way the Baal bounces.

Jeroboam - In 1 Kings 14, we hear about King Jeroboam, the first king of the northern Kingdom of Israel... but if you are an oenophile (lover of wine) you would know that a jeroboam is a wine bottle/container with a capacity four times larger than an ordinary bottle of wine. Even more useless trivia: the measure for a container that can hold the equivalent of 16 bottles of wine is called a Balthazar (like one of the three Wise Men) and one that can hold the equivalent of 20 bottles of wine is called a Nebuchadnezzar (the Babylonian King, referenced in the book of Daniel, 2nd Kings, 2nd Chronicles, Ezra, Jeremiah, and Ezekiel).

"The Straight and Narrow." The phrase the straight and narrow today means an honest and morally acceptable way of living. But, alas, this phrase is a victim of a terrible transliteration, misspelling, and translation problem. The phrase emanates from St. Matthew's Gospel, 7:14, where we are advised: "How narrow the gate and constricted the road that leads to life. And those who find it are few." Now, no one ever says "go walk the constricted and narrow" — they say, "walk the straight and narrow." So, where does that phrase "straight and narrow" come from? As they say at the beginning of The Brady Bunch: "Here's the story." In the old Catholic translation of scripture this passage read, "How narrow is the gate, and strait is the way that leadeth to life: and few there are that find it!" In this sense, "narrow" and "strait" mean basically the same thing: narrow, tight or constricted. The term "strait" refers to a narrow passage like the Straits of Gibraltar. Somehow, over time, "strait" was transliterated into "straight" (as in not-crooked, and not-crooked has come to mean honest), thus we wind up with "Straight and narrow" — with "strait" misspelt. But, let me set the record "straight" lest I leave you in dire "straits" with this phrase: The straight and narrow should be the strait (narrow) and narrow — that is the type of path that leads to Heaven... and it is narrow one!

And now, as those who change nouns to verbs might say, "Enough Scripturing." I'll say, however, this column touched merely on the tip of the iceberg of the wealth of our language's words and phrase that are baked into our Holy Scriptures. There are many, many more, but I thought I would choose these few to reflect on for this column. God bless. I remain,
